Over a long period of time smoking has become socially unacceptable and this has been accompanied by a sharp decline in smoking rates, something which is good for the long term health of New Zealanders. An important part of this process has been to make smoking largely invisible - rarely are smokers seen on screen or in public. Unfortunately, an increase in vaping is beginning to change this situation.

After decades of declining tobacco smoking in the USA they are now beginning to see an increase in youth smoking rates. While the cause of this is yet to be proven, there is a correlation with increases in vaping. Public health is too important to wait until such a link is either proved or disproved.

For the benefit of our community I believe we should restrict vaping until it is proven safe. Despite the informationm from retailers and the companies making money from vaping there have been health alerts issued in other countries. We no longer trust tobacco lobbists as a source of information as to the risks of smoking, why should we trust similar sources in terms of vaping? There may be some non-tobacco products that are safe to vape (although the level to which this is proven is debatable). Similarly on could argue that low alcohol or alcohol free beer is 'safe' to drink. However, I do not believe that there is any public interest or health benefits from altering laws and by-laws around alcohol consumption simply because there are alternatives available that could

be considered less damaging than another product. I believe the same principle can be applied to vaping and smoking.

Vaping is promoted as being beneficial in helping people give up smoking and it is fantastic that is the case. However, those people would not be allowed to smoke in areas such as playgrounds, I cannot see any logical reson to let them vape in those same locations.

I do not want my children to be exposed to public environments where people are either smoking or vaping. I do not believe it is appropriate role modelling for them, their friends or the wider public.

Thank you for the opportunity to provide comment on the draft Palmerston North Auahi Kore Smokefree and Vapefree Policy, 2020 (The draft Policy).

In general, we support the draft Policy and the inclusion of vaping in this policy. However, we make the following comments regarding the wording of the policy guidelines in relation to bus stops, shelters and terminals.

• The draft Policy guidelines on page 7 of the document designate "bus terminals and bus stops" as smokefree and vapefree areas. While we support these facilities being smoke and vape free, we are concerned that the proposed wording leads to unrealistic expectations and enforcement issues when it comes to smoking or vaping at bus stops (excluding shelters and the terminal). Bus stops which don't have a shelter are generally just a pole and sign located near the edge of the footpath and don't have a 'designated' footprint as such.
Under the current proposed wording, it is ambiguous as to where the smoke and vape free zone applies in relation to a bus stop. To make it clear, some sort of marking on the footpath or around the stop itself would be required. Given the cost

Given the cost and logistical issues associated with installing such markings we consider it would be more appropriate to only apply the restrictions at bus shelters and terminals (i.e. Main Street and the intercity terminal in The Square). This approach would be consistent with similar policies already implemented in other areas across New Zealand including, Wellington City, Whanganui, Auckland and Christchurch.

Accordingly, we request that Policy Guideline 1 XIII be reworded as follows:

"Bus terminals and bus stops shelters"

If Council wishes to retain the smoke and vape free requirement at bus stops as well
as shelters and the terminals, we request that Council install and maintain, at their
cost, signage and footpath markings around each stop clearly showing the smoke
and vape free area.

They believe it is completely SAFE or HEALTHY, not 'likely to be safer than tobacco'- of which their is big difference. No. If an individual has decided to use an electronic cigarette over smoking traditional Cigarettes this should be applauded. We need to support the great choices our people are making via vaping. Praise the harm reduction and remove the negative community association. Palmerston North City Council should encourage and support this harm reduction alternative. The health effects inflicted on the body via Vaping e-cigarettes has now been proven to be 95% less damaging than traditional cigarettes. E-cigarettes eliminate the involuntary damaging second hand effects impacted upon bystanders. This is one of the primary reasons Smoke-Free areas were originally established. E-cigarette vapour has a different chemical and physical composition. The evidence suggests vaping creates exposures far below thresholds that would be allowed for occupational health limits. The force of law should be reserved for protecting people from material harm caused by others with the use of traditional cigarettes. In many cases a vape is used in conjunction with Nicotine patches, champex and the other prescribed options. Vaping is a fantastic tool to help with the psychological aspect of smoking with the hand to mouth motion in these cases. Alongside the increased health benefits, our lower income families in the community have proven e-cigarettes to be a fantastic financial alternative. Regardless of the recent tax increase on cigarettes, they are still being purchased. These are funds needed for our growing families, eg -Food -Clothing -Heating -Education -Future planning As a community our goal should be reducing harm caused by combustible cigarettes. This is achievable. Education in conjunction with supporting a

decrease in usage when they are ready. From an outside perspective, this is a step in the right direction for our generations to come.

Please explain your response:

I do not completely agree. I personally believe some of the area's highlighted in the 2020 proposal have since 2013 demonstrated high levels of community noncompliance. Elimination has proven unsuccessful, having limitations is likely to have a better impact and reward. There needs to be a willingness to accommodate all parties. For example The Square. I went to the square to observe the current Smoking/Vaping situation.. Within a 30 minute time period I saw 37 adults and 4 children. I counted 9 adults smoking traditional cigarettes and 2 people vaping e-cigarettes. That is 24.32% smoking traditional cigarettes and 5.40% using e-cigarettes. These calculations do NOT include the children. Another example of this includes The Palmerston North hospital. The designated smoking/Vaping area has recently been removed. This has forced the general public/Unwell patients to walk around hospital grounds or sit publicly on the front gate smoking/vaping. This has done nothing but cause the people to be more open and in a plain view to the community and our children. This is the opposite desired effect. This is a concern for the community considering this displays a clear disregard to the current 2013 policy. The potential of opening a controlled "safe zone" in retaliation to this could prove to be a better option. Central Energy Trust Arena currently has a controlled system. At all large events, for example speedway. Allocated 'smoking/Vaping areas' are highlighted. At times there can be over 100 people smoking/vaping there. Inside events held at this location are catered with designated 'smoking/vaping areas' outside. This has been successful and restricts it from being publicly open to the community. This allows the individuals the right to smoke/vape but also shows a level of understanding from the event organisers within sensible guidelines. That is our freedom of choice.

3. Are there any other comments you would like to make about the proposed policy? The Auahi Kore Smokefree and Vapefree Policy 2020 has great structure. It signals a greater level of concern for the community compared to the current 2013 document. Education is key. I believe factual information regarding Vape harm reduction should be more accessible in the community. Although Vaping is a fantastic tool. I do agree it should not be encouraged in specific areas. For example, Playgrounds, skate parks or in cars with children. I do believe the additive of educational signs alongside the standard "smoke free area" sign could be beneficial in these situations.

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Response: Question 3

Thank you for the opportunity to make a submission. We commend the Council on its ongoing commitment to supporting the Government's Smokefree 2025 goal and engaging the community on its policies.

To support our submission, we would like to share some observations for your consideration.

Supporting Smokefree 2025: It is unhelpful to group smokers and vapers in the same category. Vapers don't like to be around or grouped with smokers. The Government's Smokefree 2025 goal would be better supported by the Council recognising and supporting the community of former smokers who have switched to significantly less harmful alternatives such as vaping. Having made this positive behavioural change it seems unfair to demonise vapers along with smokers, which is what this policy is effectively doing. Safe spaces need to be created for vaping to not only make vaping easier than smoking, but to incentivise smokers to switch to significantly less harmful alternatives. The policy should reflect that vaping has a place in the community to support the Government's main goal to make New Zealand Smokefree by 2025. A supportive policy objective would distinguish and incentivise smokers to switch to less harmful alternatives (such as vaping) within our community.

Current research & insights: We strongly suggest that the Council engage ASH NZ (https://www.ash.org.nz/) as part of its consultation process. We are concerned that the Council does not have the latest research and data on vaping and that this may have adverse impacts and unintended policy outcomes for the Council.

Budget - the opportunity cost: The Council's proposal doesn't detail the cost of implementing and enforcing this policy. As ratepayers, in the post-covid environment, the resources spent on this policy may be better allocated to supporting job creation / local businesses / the city's "palmy unleashed vision". These bi-laws are another layer of compliance and cost for businesses and the community that arguably adds little value to the growth and vision of the city. The implementation timetable and budget allocation should take these factors into consideration.

Commonsense Policy: The prevalence of vaping in Palmerston North simply won't stop because you say "no vaping". It demonstrates a lack of understanding of the complexity of issues. This is not a policy that empowers or supports adult smokers to make better choices.

We recommend the policy exclude R18+ events and that any policy allows for R18+ venues and workplaces (with no children 17 years or below) to make their own decisions as to whether to allow vaping spaces.

Having a policy that requires *all* events funded / supported (undefined) by the Council as being smokefree or vape free and requires event organisers to "advertise" (undefined) this is an unnecessary layer of bureaucracy and should be left up to the discretion of employers / landlords and event organisers for R18+ events. Adding additional costs to organisers of R18+ events and employers doesn't make good economic sense at this time, nor does it send a positive message about Palmerston North being a progressive thinking Council that supports less harmful alternatives to smoking for adults.

Reference group: We recommend that you engage members of the vaping community in the reference group implementation. The council should acknowledge that these small - medium sized

business owners can make valuable contributions to the process and keep the Council informed about all the different perspectives and have the voices of vapers recognised.

The Cancer Society of New Zealand Manawatu Centre aims to reduce the rate of cancer in the Manawatu region caused by harmful exposure to smoking, both active and second-hand exposure.

Cancer Society of New Zealand Manawatu Centre Incorporated is a charitable organisation covering the MidCentral DHB region of Horowhenua, Manawatu, Tararua and Palmerston North city.

Our core services are in Health Promotion, Supportive Care, Information and Research. We work with our communities to reduce the incidence and impact of cancer.

Thank you for the opportunity to comment on the proposed Palmerston North City Council's Draft Auahi Kore and Smokefree and Vapefree Policy 2020.

I am a member of the PNCC Smokefree Reference Group, a group which I recognise needs to be neutral in the consultation process, and so I declare any potential source of bias or conflict of interest in my support for the proposal to extend the Smokefree policy to include vapefree spaces. The Cancer Society is completely independent and receives no funding nor has any affiliation to the tobacco industry or the vaping industry. For the interests of transparency, it is important that oral submitters to this policy disclose whether they receive any funding or have any affiliations whatsoever with the tobacco or vaping industry.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Cancer Society of New Zealand Manawatu Centre aims to reduce the rate of smoking-related cancers in the Manawatu region. This goal can only be achieved with a community commitment to reducing the risk of smoking-related cancer through Smokefree policies in schools and workplaces, reducing the supply of tobacco, supporting Smokefree outdoor environments and that Smokefree behaviour is the norm where we live, work and play.

We have much to celebrate in our efforts to progress the central Government goal of New Zealand being Smokefree by 2025. We know that the benefits of being a Smokefree and vapefree community include positive role modelling behaviour for our children and young people, a healthy whānau-friendly environment, protecting non-smokers from the dangers of second-hand smoke, and less harm to our environment.

While 2018 Census data shows that we are reducing smoking rates in our region in comparison to 2013 Census data, we cannot afford to be complacent and lessen our commitment to the goal of becoming Smokefree by 2025.

The 2018 Census data recorded Current smoking rates in MidCentral DHB region as 15% of the population, in comparison to 13.2% total New Zealand population.

More concerning is that Māori adult smoking rates in MidCentral DHB region are at 28% nearly twice that of the adult smoking population in our region. In the 20-24-year-old group, Māori smoking rates are 29% nearly twice that of the total population of 20-24-year-old group of 18% smoking regularly.

In the 25-29-year-old group in the MidCentral DHB region, Māori smoking rates are at 35% (1)

The national Youth19: A Youth2000 Survey on vaping use showed that many adolescents who vape are non-smokers, with vaping in Year 10 students rapidly increasing since 2015, while the decline in smoking in this age group has stalled, and begun to reverse, particularly among Maori and students in low decile schools.

The Adolescent Health Research Group responsible for the Youth19: A Youth2000 survey recommended prohibiting vaping and heated tobacco products in legislated smokefree areas, and argued that strong protections must be put in place to protect young people from vaping and smoking. It is vital that youth in youth in Maori, Pacific and low-income communities are protected from smoking and vaping to address health disparities. (2)

We want a healthier world for our children and grandchildren, reducing the amount of smoking young people see and decreasing the likelihood they will start to smoke. This belief underpins the need to expand PNCC Smokefree Outdoor Areas Policy to include vapefree behaviour.

RECOMMENDATIONS

Palmerston North City Council has provided real leadership in the Local Government arena of Community Well beings nationally, and I ask that you continue to champion the Smokefree commitment for the benefit of the health and wellbeing our community.

The Cancer Society submission offers support for the proposed extension to the 'Auahi Kore Smokefree and Vapefree Policy 2020 to include Smokefree and vapefree spaces

Cancer Society Manawatu asks that:

- Palmerston North City Council actively promote Palmerston North as a Smokefree and vapefree city, celebrating our reputation as a city that cares for the wellbeing of our community. (3)
- PNCC continues to support the Smokefree initiatives proposed in the Healthy Community Plan in order to strengthen our commitment to being a Smokefree and vapefree city. (4)
- PNCC extends the proposed Auahi Kore Smokefree and Vapefree Policy 2020 to also include sports clubs holding a recreational property lease with the Council, Palmerston North Airport, Splashhurst Community Centre, Ashhurst Domain, He Ara Kotahi pathway, Manawatu River walkway, Milson shopping centre, Highbury Shopping Centre, Hokowhitu Village, the Railway land, Monrad Park, with these all being areas frequented by families and young people
- Ashhurst, Longburn and Bunnythorpe are part of the Palmerston North City Council region and community public spaces in these areas need to be considered.
- Community events planning will reflect Smokefree and Vapefree Outdoor Areas Policy in the planning, scheduling, promotion, advertising and event information, provided.

 Palmerston North Conference and Function Centre, we would also like to see included
 Splashhurst Community Centre, sports clubs on Council leased land, and Palmerston North
 Airport, all being places frequented by families and young people.
- The PNCC (2019) Attitudes Towards Smoking and Vaping in Outdoor Areas in Palmerston
 North Survey showed that least 60% of those surveyed, supported Ashhurst Domain, He Ara
 Kotahi, the River walkway, Milson shopping centre, Highbury Shopping Centre, Hokowhitu
 Village, the Railway land, Monrad Park to be made smokefree, and these areas also need to
 be considered. (6)
- While not considered in the Attitudes towards smoking and vaping in outdoor areas in Palmerston North survey, Ashhurst, Longburn and Bunnythorpe are also part of the Palmerston North City Council and community public spaces in these areas need to be considered.
- The PNCC (2019) Palmerston North Community Attitudes Survey showed the need for improved awareness campaigns including smokefree and vapefree signage, especially for outdoor dining areas on a public footpath and the City Centre, with only 40% survey participants recognising that outdoor dining spaces were smokefree.
 This also highlights the need to include associated relevant policies and strategies, ie. Signs and Use of Public Places Bylaw (provisions relating to the table and chairs permit) and Healthy Community Plan, and an awareness education plan, so there is a cohesive approach to a smokefree vapefree community. (4, 5)
- Council funded events and functions are designated smokefree and vapefree by requiring
 display and announcement of smokefree and vapefree messages:
 In the pre-event promotion and advertising, smokefree and vapefree messaging needs to be
 included to support and raise awareness of the Council and community commitment to
 smokefree and vapefree environments.

3. Are there any other comments you would like to make about the proposed policy?

Concerns about vaping

Smoking remains a significant threat to New Zealanders' public health, especially in Māori and Pacific communities.

Smoking is the leading cause of preventable death in New Zealand. Every year 5,000 people die prematurely in New Zealand from smoking-related illness.

Tobacco smoking kills as many as two-thirds of people who smoke long-term.

It is the single biggest cause of cancer, and cancer is the main cause of death for New Zealanders. (7) Stopping people from becoming addicted to smoking in the first place is the most effective way we have of reducing both smoking-related harm and inequalities in cancer outcomes.

In our local DHB region, 2018 Census data current smoking rates in MidCentral DHB region are now registered as 15% of the population, in comparison to 13.2% total New Zealand population.

More concerning is that Māori adult smoking rates in MidCentral DHB region are at 28% nearly twice that of the adult smoking population in our region. In the 20-24-year-old group, Māori smoking rates are 29% nearly twice that of the total population of 20-24-year-old group of 18% smoking regularly.

In the 25-29-year-old group in the MidCentral DHB region, Māori smoking rates are at 35% (1)

New Zealand's approach to tobacco control since the introduction of the Smokefree Environments Act in 1990 has been very effective in reducing smoking prevalence across all age groups, but particularly in young people. ASH Year 10 Survey data shows that regular (daily, weekly, monthly) smoking prevalence declined among 14-15-year olds from 28.6 % in 1999 to 4.7 % in 2016.

However, since 2015 the decline in youth smoking slowed and began to reverse, and in 2019 regular smoking in this age group had increased from 4.7 % in 2016 to 5.9 %. This increase has occurred alongside a rapid increase in regular youth vaping in both New Zealand (12% in 2019) and worldwide.

The Cancer Society is very concerned with this recent development. We are also concerned to see that between 2018 and 2019, regular smoking increased significantly in Mäori Year 10 students, from 11.6% to 13.6% (8).

There is emerging evidence that raises serious concerns about the risks to non-smokers and young people, our rangatahi. These include the potential for nicotine addiction, the impact of nicotine itself on cognitive development, the need to protect young people's health and wellbeing from the as-yet-unknown long-term impacts of these products, the increased risk that non-smokers who vape will begin to smoke conventional cigarettes, the potential for harm to respiratory and cardiovascular health

Young people start vaping because of curiosity, peer endorsement, novelty, flavourings, industry marketing, the perception it is relatively harmless, to manage smoking restrictions and to stop smoking.

According to Cancer Society Auckland-Northland (2019) report Vaping: *degrees of harm. E-cigarette and smokeless tobacco products Summary of evidence*, the available evidence base does not definitively answer the question of whether e-cigarettes help smokers to quit (9).

Local schools' comment:

In preparation for this submission, local secondary schools were approached for their opinions on the policy options and what their own school experience of vaping was.

Tracy Walker, Principal of Palmerston North Girls High School, stated "As the principal of a girls' secondary school I am very concerned with how vaping is being portrayed. For example, as a 'cool' or 'sexy' thing to do and as an acceptable social smoking cessation tool. Its effects are not fully known or understood and teenagers are taking up vaping - not as a smoking cessation aid but to 'try something' new. We are a smoke free campus and that should include vaping. I feel the law is still a little grey here and needs tightening. From time to time, we have incidences of girls wanting to try vaping because they perceive it as a little 'illicit' and 'fun' and 'exciting'. We don't know the long-term ramifications but it is being marketed as 'cool' and 'sexy' with lots of interesting flavours. I feel this is wrong. The country is aiming to be 'smoke free' by 2025 and I feel this should include vaping -but either way, vaping is not something teenagers should be trying. We educate our young people that vaping is not something they should be taking it up. It's only reason for being is as a smoking cessation tool; it is not appropriate for young people." (personal communication, 28 July, 2020)

Queen Elizabeth College provided the following statement: Queen Elizabeth College supports the Palmerston North City Council to extend its smoke-free outdoor policy to include vape-free as we want to strengthen a safe environment for our young people. (personal communication, 23 July, 2020)

Awatapu College, Palmerston North Boys High School and St Peter's College are also providing submissions to the PNCC Draft Auahi Kore and Smokefree and Vapefree Policy 2020.

Benefits of smokefree and vapefree:

The benefits of smokefree and vaperfree outdoor environments, playgrounds and reserves, sportsgrounds, community events, transport hubs and outdoor dining places for us all include healthier workplaces, reduced litter, and making it easier for people to quit smoking and vaping. Including vapefree in the Smokefree Environments Policy means that:

- Making smokefree areas also vapefree reduces the risk of vaping becoming normalised, particularly among non-smokers and young people.
- It minimises role modelling of vaping to children and lessen the risk that they see vaping as a cool recreational behaviour
- It reduces public confusion and make Smokefree/vapefree easier to enforce.
- The long-term health impacts of exhaled vapour from vaping products are still unclear. We know that while potentially vaping may deliver fewer harmful chemicals than cigarettes, it may still affect the lungs in the same way. (9)

Support for the expansion of the Smokefree outdoor policy to include vapefree

As the Clinical Executive of Cancer Screening, Treatment and Support at MidCentral DHB, Dr Claire Hardie supports the Cancer Society's position that smoke free outdoor policies should be expanded to include vaping.

"The use of e-cigarettes may be used as a tool to support current smokers to quit and as a harm reduction strategy. However, we would not wish to see non-smokers start to use e-cigarettes as there remains concern regarding the long-term effects of vaping. Expanding smoke free areas to also be vape free reduces the risk that vaping will be an accepted and normalised behaviour in our community. Without having to differentiate between smoking and vaping it makes enforcement of a smoke free and vape free policy easier. Most importantly, we do not wish the younger members of our community to start vaping as they see this as a less risky or more socially acceptable behaviour than smoking cigarettes. By promoting and enforcing smoke free and vape free environments, there are fewer opportunities for role modelling of vaping to children and young people and provides a healthy environment for all our community to enjoy." (personal communication, 30 July, 2020)

In a national context

At a national level, in considering and adopting a smokefree and vapefree environment policy, PNCC would join the path that other councils have made across New Zealand to support smokefree and vapefree communities

Hauraki and Whanganui Councils, Whangarei, Kaipara, Matamata Piako, Invercargill, Hanmer Springs, Rotorua and Taupo District Councils have all now included vapefree in their smokefree environment policies. (10).

Wellington City Council Smokefree Action Plan asked that people not vape in smokefree spaces or at smokefree events (11) and Hutt City Council made their outdoor spaces smokefree and vapefree.

In 2019, Hutt City Council made the following areas smokefree and vapefree: Playgrounds, outdoor public swimming pools, parks and sportsgrounds, including skate parks, bus shelters and bus stops, train stations, beaches, outdoor public areas around council buildings and facilities, outdoor pavement dining areas, Lower Hutt CBD and suburban shopping centres, and All Hutt City Council events (12)

Hanmer Springs trialled smokefree and vapefree for 6 months, and reported that of the 681 visitor responses, 90 per cent supported going smoke-free permanently, while 83 per cent said it should be smoke and vape-free. The commitment to smokefree and vapefree areas is now being continued. (13).

PNCC (2019) Attitudes Towards Smoking and Vaping in Outdoor Areas in Palmerston North Survey, showed there was local community support for treating vaping and smoking in the same way, and making smokefree environments vapefree. (6)

Council leadership

The Council has a leadership role in the wellbeing of the community, aspiring to Palmerston North being a safe and healthy city, and creating the environments to support this vision. Our community needs your aspirational leadership to continue. Local government has an important role in terms of public health within the communities they have been elected to serve. If we are to reduce the rates and impact of smoking-related cancers where our community can live, work and play, we need to

put the health and wellbeing of our community, and in particular, our most vulnerable, our children, and our future generations at the heart of our decision making.

Conclusion

Many outdoor places like parks, sports grounds and playgrounds all around New Zealand are now Smokefree and vapefree, Smokefree and vapefree community areas help create positive role modelling behaviour for our children, our next generation, a healthy whānau-friendly environment and protect non-smokers from the dangers of second-hand smoke.

The Cancer Society of New Zealand is working hard to raise awareness about the on-going harm caused by smoking. We are fully aware however that we are only one player in a complex environment where we need the support of many agencies and the community to achieve a successful outcome for the wellbeing of New Zealanders. If further extensions to Smokefree Outdoor Areas are successful and more organisations are actively promoting Smokefree and vapefree, New Zealand could see a move towards whole communities, towns and cities becoming Smokefree and vapefree. Now isn't that a vision worth working for!

 That the memorandum entitled 'Summary of submissions on the proposed Auahi Kore Smokefree and Vapefree Policy' presented to the Planning & Strategy Committee on 14 October 2020, be received.

1. ISSUE

The Council is reviewing the 'Smokefree Outdoor Areas Policy 2013'. This memorandum provides a summary of issues raised by submitters in their written submissions on the proposed Auahi Kore Smokefree and Vapefree Policy.

2. BACKGROUND

The Smokefree Outdoor Areas Policy was adopted by Council in 2013. On 24 June 2020 Council approved the proposed Auahi Kore Smokefree and Vapefree Policy 2020 for consultation. The submission period was open from Saturday 4 July until Friday 31 July 2020.

By close of the submission period, 223 submissions were received, and 14 people indicated they wished to be heard. Attachment 1, 2 and 3 provide a summary of these submissions.

3. RESPONSE TO CONSULTATION

Various mediums were utilised to raise awareness of the consultation period including:

1) Print media

A media release went out on 03 July 2020 which was picked up by the Manawatū Guardian and a news article appeared online on the NZHerald website.





On 30 July 2020, officers arranged a workshop session with youth from YMCA, Te Aroha Noa and regulars to Youth Space. Around 15 or so youth were in attendance. The main points that came out of the discussions are listed below:

- Being more empathetic towards smokers/vapers as each person has their own story and reasons for becoming a smoker/vaper.
- Commonly held views that people should not be penalised for smoking or vaping and there should be a culture of trusting smokers/vapers to be respectful and courteous towards others in public spaces.
- Commonly held view that there should be no smoking around children. Some participants shared how they actively avoided children when they smoke in a public space.
- Strong agreement that there should be clear designated areas in the City to smoke and vape.
- The preference for designated smoking areas were for places that were not in public view, as the common experience for young people were judgemental looks from strangers that made them feel devalued.
- Smoking/vaping is an addiction and how people deal with their addiction will vary from one person to another. For some it is a coping mechanism and genuinely can not help it.
- Most participants had reservations about vaping.





- 3. That the Chief Executive be directed to engage with the relevant Government agencies and the office of the Palmerston North Member of Parliament to initiate the necessary amendments to the Palmerston North Reserves Empowering Act 1966 to enable the partial sale or development of Huia Street Reserve for housing, including the potential for a mixed-use housing development containing supporting recreational and smallscale commercial activity.
- 4. That it be noted that, should the Palmerston North Reserves Empowering Act 1966 be amended to enable the partial sale or development of Huia Street Reserve, lease arrangements and District Plan zoning can provide greater certainty to the Manawatū Lawn Tennis Club regarding the long-term future use of that part of Huia Street Reserve currently occupied by the Manawatū Lawn Tennis Club.
- 5. That the Chief Executive be directed to engage in discussions with the Manawatū Lawn Tennis Club with the objective of providing greater certainty regarding the long-term future use of that part of Huia Street Reserve currently occupied by the Manawatū Lawn Tennis Club, including reviewing the current lease arrangements and retention of the current Recreation Zone.

RATIONALE FOR THE RECOMMENDATIONS

1. OVERVIEW OF THE PROBLEM OR OPPORTUNITY

- 1.1 The portion of Huia Street Reserve formerly occupied by the Manawatū Bowling Club has been vacant since 2005 and there is currently a significant housing shortfall in Palmerston North.
- 1.2 The latest average weekly rent data from the MBIE rental bond database shows an average annual weekly rent of \$356 in Palmerston North in the year ended August 2020 compared with \$320 in the year to August 2019, an increase of 11.3%. Quotable Value NZ data shows in the three months ended July 2020, average residential property values in the city were \$515,832, a 14.8% increase or \$66,551 increase from July 2019. That is an average weekly increase of \$1,280 over the last 12 months.
- 1.3 While there are a number of mechanisms available and being used by Council, Government agencies and the private sector to address the housing shortfall, the use of Council land for housing is explicitly identified in the City Development Strategy as follows:

Council also has a significant property portfolio that can be used to contribute to city growth and development, while also providing revenue. This could include



repurposing underutilised land or identifying land where uses can be relocated to enable sustainable housing development and intensification.

1.4 For the reasons outlined above, the Council prepared a statement of proposal on the future use of the Huia Street Reserve. The proposal was:

That the Council initiates the necessary amendments to the Palmerston North Reserves Act 1922 and / or the Palmerston North Reserves Empowering Act 1966 and the District Plan to enable the sale or development of Huia Street Reserve for housing.

1.5 80 submissions were received covering a range of topics. Submissions were heard at August Planning and Strategy Committee. Council now needs to make decision on the statement of proposal.

2. BACKGROUND AND PREVIOUS COUNCIL DECISIONS

2.1 Council passed the following resolutions in September 2019 (67-19):

That the Future Use of Huia Street Reserve (corner of Park Road and Fitzherbert Avenue) Statement of Proposal – October 2019, including the Potential Housing Development Scenarios, be approved for public consultation.

That the consultation on the Future Use of Huia Street Reserve Statement of Proposal – October 2019 be for a period of at least one month, beginning from a date to be determined by the Chief Executive.

That the Chairperson and Deputy Chairperson of the Finance and Performance Committee be authorised to make minor amendments to the Future Use of Huia Street Reserve (corner of Park Road and Fitzherbert Avenue) Statement of Proposal – October 2019.

2.2 Further detail on the background and history of Huia Street Reserve was provided in the statement of proposal.

3. DESCRIPTION OF OPTIONS

3.1 The options were described as follows in the statement of proposal.

Option 1: To initiate the necessary amendments to the Palmerston North Reserves Act 1922 and / or the Palmerston North Reserves Empowering Act 1966 and the District Plan to enable the sale or development of Huia Street Reserve for housing.

Option 2: Land-bank the site: No changes to the overall management regime for the reserve. The land is retained by the Council for a use to be determined at some time in the future.



Option 3: Develop for recreational purposes: The reserve is developed by the Council for a recreational purpose such as a park, playground or sports field.

Option 4: Consider proposals from the community to use the site for a recreational, cultural or community purpose: The Council undertakes a consultation exercise and engages with key stakeholders to consider proposals for the use of the site.

Option 5: Enable the sale or development of Huia Street Reserve for a commercial purpose: Similar to the preferred option but the site is zoned for a commercial use, not a residential use. While included as a potential option for the purposes of consultation, this option is not supported by Council strategy.

3.2 Taking into account the submissions received, there is also the ability to adopt a hybrid that provides the potential to deliver on multiple options.

4. ANALYSIS OF SUBMISSIONS

- 4.1 A summary of submissions was presented to the August 2020 Planning and Strategy Committee. For ease of reference the summary is also included as attachment one to this report.
- 4.2 The summary of submissions categorised the submissions under a series of issues or topics that are analysed below.

Rates: One submission suggested selling the land for the highest price to lower rates. The summary of options analysis table records that options 1 and 5 provide an alternative revenue source.

Consultation: The three submissions on this topic raised bias, pre-determination and concern regarding the consultation process. Consistent with the principles of consultation, the statement of proposal identified a preferred option. It also included reference to strategic documents that supported the preferred option. 140 surrounding landowners were notified of the consultation. Key stakeholders notified included Sport Manawatū, CEDA, Environment Network Manawatū, Manawatū Lawn Tennis, Rangitāne, Jain Lees-Galloway, Kainga Ora, DoC and NZTA.

Stakeholders: The Ministry of Education, Kainga Ora and PNGHS indicated they would like to be involved in the process. PNGHS presented at the August 2020 Planning and Strategy Committee meeting and Council officers meet regularly with the Ministry of Education and Kainga Ora.

District Plan: The submission on this topic suggested making changes to the District Plan to enable more housing rather than the proposal to use this land for housing. A series of changes targeted at increasing urban intensification were made as part of the Sectional District Plan Review. A series of District Plan Changes are also being delivered to provide additional greenfield capacity. While the city is seeing increasing



rates of intensification, this tends to be the more traditional form of intensification as opposed to multi-unit housing, terrace housing or apartments. As identified in the statement of proposal, the preferred option provides the opportunity for Council to show leadership by supporting a medium density housing development that will help support change in the traditional housing typologies being delivered by the market.

Revenue Allocation: One submission sought that the additional revenue is used for play, recreation and sport. The statement of proposal recorded that, subject to the nature of any amendments made to the Palmerston North Reserves Act 1922 and / or the Palmerston North Reserves Empowering Act 1966, any revenue generated from the sale or development of Huia Street Reserve for housing would be used to help fund the various recreational projects identified in the Council's Long Term Plan.

School Zoning: PNGHS were concerned additional housing would place pressure on their zone and school. This is an issue for PNGHS to address with the Ministry of Education.

Demand for Housing: Seven submissions supported the proposal given the strong demand for housing in the city.

Medium – High Density Housing: Fourteen submissions offered support conditional on a range of matters they would like included or considered as part of any medium or high-density housing development. For example, incorporation of good urban design, preference for apartments, solar panels and shops at ground floor. These are matters for subsequent stages including rezoning, detailed design and consenting.

Low Density Housing: Two submissions preferred low density housing to manage impacts on infrastructure. These are matters for subsequent stages including rezoning, detailed design and consenting.

Housing Affordability: Eight submissions identified a preference for what they categorised as social, affordable or Council housing. Council does not need to decide at this time what form of housing will be delivered should it decide to proceed with the preferred proposal. When the time comes to making this decision, the Council should carefully consider what particular housing issue it is seeking to address. Further commentary on this matter is included in section 6 of this report.

Land-Bank: One submission supported land-banking. As detailed in the summary analysis of options in this report, land-banking is an inefficient use of land and a lost opportunity to address housing supply and provide an alternative form of revenue.

Commercial Use: One submission identified the potential effects of commercial use. Such issues could be addressed at the rezoning, detailed design and consenting stage should the Council decide to proceed with option 5. Commercial use is not the recommended option.



Traffic Congestion: Six submissions identified concerns regarding traffic congestion. This issue can be addressed at the rezoning, detailed design and consenting stage. There may also be an opportunity to consider changes to the intersection to support the development and Council's broader transport planning objectives.

Access: Five submissions identified concerns regarding access. This issue can be addressed at the rezoning, detailed design and consenting stage. There may also be any opportunity to consider changes to the intersection to support the development and Council's broader transport planning objectives.

Carparking: Two submissions identified concerns regarding carparking. The new National Policy Statement on Urban Development requires Council to remove all carparking standards from the District Plan, meaning the development could proceed with no provision of carparking. Like congestion and access, carparking will be addressed at the rezoning detailed design and consenting stage.

Retain / Restore Reserve: Twenty-two submissions identified a wide range of options to retain or restore the reserve for public use including a carbon sink, tourist park, public park, water features, education park, playground, enviro-centre and open-air theatre. There is significant public open space within the vicinity of Huia Street Reserve including Ongley Park, Victoria Esplanade, Fitzherbert Park, Wallace Park and the Manawatū River. No strategic documents approved by the Council identify a specific use for the reserve. Development of the land for a reserve would also be a lost opportunity to address housing supply and provide an alternative form of revenue. A programme to investigate an enviro-centre will be considered as part of the 2021 Long Term Plan process. An enviro-centre and combined office for Environment Network Manawatū is better suited to the city centre, which is where the District Plan anticipates new office activity. A city centre location would encourage more serendipitous interactions and allow users to visit as part of a broader city centre experience, similar to how the central library operates. The enviro-centre has also been included in the brief for the further work being undertaken to progress the Civic and Cultural Precinct Masterplan.

Active Recreation: Four submissions suggest the site is used for active recreation, including badminton and dog agility. There is no evidence of the need for additional facilities for badminton or dog agility at this time. Dog agility facilities are available at Ahimate Reserve and Linklater Reserve.

Cultural and Community Development: Fifteen submissions identified potential cultural and community uses for the site, including community gardens / pataka kai, marae, cultural site, community facility and PNGHS. Rangitāne were consulted during the preparation of the statement of proposal and were sent copies of the consultation material, but no submission was received from Rangitāne. While the community uses suggested in submissions could be located at Huia Street Reserve, the benefits of locating them at the reserve would need to be weighed up against



the benefits of the recommended proposal. The community uses suggested could also be accommodated on other Council land.

Manawatū Lawn Tennis Club: The Manawatū Lawn Tennis Club lodged a submission citing potential reverse sensitivity concerns (complaints regarding lighting and noise) and uncertainty regarding what the proposal may mean for the future of the club at the current site. The Manawatū Lawn Tennis Club also would like to complete a feasibility study to investigate using part of the undeveloped portion of Huia Street Reserve for an indoor tennis facility and small-scale commercial complex, e.g. a commercial café or bar that doubles as a clubroom. These uses could form part of a mixed-use housing development. Council may also want to consider some other form of recreation to support a mixed-use housing development and the recommendations enable that.

Two meetings have been held with the Manawatū Lawn Tennis Club. The first was prior to submissions closing and the second was following the presentation of their submission at the August 2020 Planning and Strategy Committee.

At the second meeting, Council officers explained that:

- a) The potential reverse sensitivity effects would be addressed via the District Plan Change and resource consent process under the RMA 1991.
- b) Further certainty regarding the long-term future use of their current site could be provided by way of an amended lease agreement and the retention of the Recreation Zone, which does not provide for housing development. The current lease provides the club with an option out to 2027, but this could be amended to provide greater long-term certainty.
- c) An amended proposal and recommendation to Council could provide the option for the club to explore the feasibility of delivering an indoor tennis facility and small-scale commercial activity alongside a housing development. If the feasibility study did not support an indoor facility the Council could still proceed with a housing development or a mixed-use housing development containing an alternative recreation facility.

The Manawatū Lawn Tennis club were comfortable with items a) to c) above.

There is no programme in the current 10 Year Plan for a feasibility study for an indoor tennis facility. If the Manawatū Lawn Tennis Club were seeking Council support for a feasibility study (or potential indoor facility), this would need to follow the investment decision-making process agreed by Council as part of the Manawatū-Whanganui Regional Sports Facility Plan and the upcoming 10 Year Plan process. The recommendations of this report do not provide any guarantee to the Manawatū Lawn Tennis Club that the Council will support or fund the feasibility study or potential indoor tennis facility. Any such decision would need to be made in the



context of the Regional Sports Facility Plan and 10 Year Plan. The recommendations do however provide the option for tennis (and other potential recreation) to be considered as plans are progressed for the development of Huia Street Reserve for housing, or a mixed-use development.

5. ANALYSIS OF OPTIONS

5.1 **Option 1:** To initiate the necessary amendments to the Palmerston North Reserves Act 1922 and / or the Palmerston North Reserves Empowering Act 1966 and the District Plan to enable the sale or development of Huia Street Reserve for housing.

Analysis: This was the recommended proposal. The key reasons why it was identified as the preferred option are that it addresses the housing supply issue and presents an opportunity for Council to show leadership by supporting a medium density housing development. This option could also provide for a potential mixed-use housing development.

Taking into account the submissions received and the further engagement with the Manawatū Lawn Tennis Club, this is the recommended option (the proposal), but it has been modified slightly to include the potential to consider a mixed-use housing development containing supporting recreational and small-scale commercial activity.

5.2 **Option 2:** Land-bank the site: No changes to the overall management regime for the reserve. The land is retained by the Council for a use to be determined at some time in the future.

Analysis: This option gained little support in submissions and does not address the housing supply issue or advance the use of the site for any recreational or community use.

5.3 **Option 3:** Develop for recreational purposes: The reserve is developed by the Council for a recreational purpose such as a park, playground or sports field.

Analysis: While a number of potential recreational uses were proposed in submissions, most lacked detail and the funding to deliver them. As detailed in the summary table, this option will not address the housing supply issue, will likely require an additional budget and will not provide an alternative revenue source.

Option 4: Consider proposals from the community to use the site for a recreational, cultural or community purpose: The Council undertakes a consultation exercise and engages with key stakeholders to consider proposals for the use of the site.

Analysis: While a number of potential community uses were proposed in submissions, most lacked detail and the funding or budget to deliver them. As detailed in the summary table, this option will not address the housing supply issue,



will likely require an additional budget and will not provide an alternative revenue source.

Option 5: Enable the sale or development of Huia Street Reserve for a commercial purpose: Similar to the preferred option but the site is zoned for a commercial use, not a residential use. While included as a potential option for the purposes of consultation, this option is not supported by Council strategy.

Analysis: This option gained little support in submissions and does not address the housing supply issue. Large scale commercial development could also undermine the centres-based philosophy in the District Plan that directs new office and retail development to the city centre. Some small-scale commercial development could form part of a potential mixed-use housing development.

6. OTHER MATTERS

- 6.1 **Legal Advice:** The proposal was that the Council initiates the necessary amendments to the Palmerston North Reserves Act 1922 and / or the Palmerston North Reserves Empowering Act 1966 and the District Plan to enable the sale or development of Huia Street Reserve for housing. Legal advice has been sought on the best mechanism to give effect to the proposal. A copy of the legal advice is included as attachment two.
- 6.2 For the reasons outlined within the legal advice, it is recommended that an amendment is sought to the Palmerston North Reserves Empowering Act 1966 (not the Palmerston North Reserves Act 1922). Of note, paragraph 24 of the legal advice records that the purpose of the Palmerston North Reserves Empowering Act 1966 is "an Act to empower the Council of the City of Palmerston North to sell and manage lands vested in it under the Palmerston North Reserves Act 1922".
- Paragraph 26 of the legal advice records "We do not consider that the amendment processes discussed above could be utilised in respect of part of the Reserve only. That is because it is recorded on one Record of Title". Further advice from CR Law obtained to assist with finalising this report confirmed that it is not possible to subdivide the site without first lifting the reserve status. Notwithstanding that, as detailed in the recommendations, lease arrangements and District Plan zoning can provide long term certainty to the Manawatū Lawn Tennis Club. Furthermore, should the Manawatū Lawn Tennis Club decide to vacate the site in the future, the recommended amendment to the Palmerston North Reserves Empowering Act 1966 would mean the Council would be able to consider all options for the future use of the balance of Huia Street without having to return to Parliament for a further amendment.
- 6.4 **Housing Typology:** A number of submissions raised the type of housing that should be delivered on the site, assuming the proposal is approved by the Council and an



amendment is passed to the legislation. Council landholdings and programmes provide the Council with the opportunity to address the following housing issues:

- a) Land and housing supply, e.g. Whakarongo subdivision.
- b) Provision of social housing, e.g. Papaioea Place.
- c) The opportunity to demonstrate leadership and deliver housing not currently being delivered by the market, e.g. medium density housing or dwellings targeted at first home buyers.

It is important the Council carefully considers what housing issue(s) it is seeking to address when making decisions regarding potential housing projects. Should the recommendations of this report be approved, the Council does not need to make a decision at this time regarding what type of housing that is delivered on the site. However, given its location close to the city centre and high amenity areas such as the Esplanade and Manawatū River, the site presents a good opportunity to demonstrate leadership by delivering medium-density housing — a typology that is not currently being provided by the market.

7. CONCLUSION

7.1 The recommended proposal addresses the housing supply issue, is consistent with direction provided in the City Development Strategy and responds in part to the concerns and opportunities expressed in submissions.

8. NEXT ACTIONS

8.1 Implement the recommendations and continue to collaborate with the Manawatū Lawn Tennis Club.

SUBJECT: Development of the Huia Street Reserve

Introduction

- We have been asked to advise on the various options available to the Palmerston North City Council ("Council") regarding the potential sale and development of the Huia Street Reserve at the corner of Park Road and Fitzherbert Avenue in Palmerston North.
- 2. The Council has consulted on how the Huia Street Reserve is to be used in the future. The Council's identified preferred option is to make all necessary amendments to the Palmerston North Reserves Act 1922 and/or the Palmerston North Reserves Empowering Act 1966, and the District Plan, to enable the sale or development of the Reserve for housing.
- A Statement of Proposal was released in November 2019 with submissions on consultation heard before the Council's Planning and Strategy Committee in August 2020.
- 4. This advice is prepared to accompany the Council Officer's report back to the Planning and Strategy Committee on the submissions that have been heard, and to give legal recommendations as to the next steps in relation to the Council's preferred option.

Summary

- 5. The Huia Street Reserve is subject to the Palmerston North Reserves Act 1922. This Act does not empower the Council to sell the land.
- 6. If the Council decides to proceed with the sale of the Huia Street Reserve, an act of Parliament will be required to provide the necessary mechanism to sell the land. This could either be by way of an amendment to the Palmerston North Reserves Act 1922 or the Palmerston North Reserves Empowering Act 1966.
- In our opinion, the preferred option is an amendment to the Palmerston North Reserves Empowering Act 1966.



- 8. The process for introducing a local act into Parliament is prescribed by the Standing Orders for the House of Representatives. The Council, as a local authority, is able to promote the bill. Practically, input will be required from Council's legal advisors, the local member of Parliament, the Office of the Clerk for the House of Representatives and the Parliamentary Counsel Office.
- 9. The process is likely to take a minimum of six months (and more likely somewhere in the vicinity of 12 months) but is dependent to a large degree on the House of Representatives once the preliminary procedures have been completed by the Council.

The Reserve

- 10. The Huia Street Reserve ("Reserve") is held in Record of Title WN941/84 and is legally described as Lots 1 4 on Deposited Plan 545. The Reserve is currently vested in the Palmerston North City Council with a specified purpose of a public park, recreation ground and botanical garden.
- 11. The Reserve is subject to the Palmerston North Reserves Act 1922 ("the 1922 Act"). The 1922 Act was passed to facilitate the management of the reserves of the Borough of Palmerston North and set out various provisions which related to the management and disposal of revenue derived from certain reserves.
- 12. The reserves to which the Act applies are set out in Schedule 1. Schedule 1 refers to Section 1536 in the town of Palmerston North. This land was subsequently subdivided to form the Reserve. Accordingly, the Council's powers in respect of the Reserve are limited to those set out in the Act. Importantly, the Act does not provide the Council with any power of sale in respect of the Reserve. There is another piece of legislation that applies to certain reserves in Palmerston North which is the Palmerston North Reserves Empowering Act 1966 ("the 1966 Act") however the 1966 Act does not apply to the Reserve.

Options to Sell the Reserve

- 13. Consultation has been undertaken regarding the various options for the proposed future use of the Reserve. The Council has not yet made a decision on the next steps that it wishes to take in respect of the Reserve, with a number of options being addressed in the Statement of Proposal.
- 14. This advice has been drafted to provide the Council with a practical overview of the options available to it in the event that it resolves to advance with its preferred option which is "to is to initiate the necessary amendments to the Palmerston North Reserves Act 1922 and / or the Palmerston North Reserve Empowering Act 1966 and the District Plan to enable the sale or development of Huia Street Reserve for housing."
- 15. As Council is aware that to proceed with its preferred option legislative change is required, given there is no power to sell the Reserve under the 1922 Act. We consider there are two options available to the Council, as follows.



Option 1

- The first option is to amend the 1922 Act. Such amendment could take two forms (which we
 describe as sub-options.
- 17. The first sub-option is to amend the 1922 Act to provide that the Reserve is no longer subject to it. Importantly, this would not revoke or uplift the Reserve's status as a reserve, because we consider that it will still be subject to the Reserves Act 1977, having regard to the definition of "reserve" in the Reserves Act 1977.
- 18. Amending the 1922 Act to provide that the Reserve is no longer subject to it would remove the obvious constraint posed by the 1922 Act, which is that there is no power of sale. However, there is also no power of sale under the Reserves Act 1977. Instead, what the Reserves Act 1977 provides is a mechanism whereby the reserve classification may be revoked. Once the classification is revoked, the Council would be free to sell or otherwise dispose of the land. The process is prescribed in s 24 of the Reserves Act 1977 which would need to be followed.
- 19. The second sub-option is to amend the 1922 Act to provide for a power of sale in respect of the land under the Act (or in respect of only certain land under the Act). This would be significantly more complex than simply removing the Reserve from the ambit of the 1922 Act, and also somewhat duplicitous of the 1966 Act, given the 1966 Act already contains a power of sale mechanism. If Option 1 is preferred, we would recommend the first amendment to the 1922 Act set out at paragraph [17] above.

Option 2

- 20. The second option is to amend the 1966 Act to bring the Reserve under the 1966 Act. This could be achieved by way of a simple amendment to vest the land in the Palmerston North City Council pursuant to s 3 of the 1966 Act (and include a further schedule which describes the land or amend an existing schedule). The Council would then be able to exercise the powers of sale contained in s 4A of the 1966 Act, provided it follows the process set out in that Act, both in respect of the sale process itself and the application of any sale proceeds.
- 21. We understand a similar process was used in respect of part of the Reserve that was sold to the Crown in 2003, used for the expansion of Palmerston North Girls High School, and resulting in the Palmerston North Reserves Empowering Amendment Act 2003. While this context is not wholly analogous, there is some precedent in respect of the process.
- 22. In the event that the 1966 Act was amended to include the Reserve, we do not consider that the provisions of the Reserves Act 1977 would apply. That is because s 3 of the 1966 Act expressly provides that the lands described in Schedules 1 and 4 of the 1966 Act (a proposed amendment would either amend the existing schedules or add a further schedule) will no longer be subject to the provisions of the Palmerston North Reserves Act 1922 or the Reserves and Domains Act 1953.
- 23. The Reserves and Domains Act 1953 was the precursor legislation to the Reserves Act 1977 and while it has now been repealed, the reference should be interpreted as a reference to the Reserves Act 1977. This is because s 22(2) of the Interpretation Act 1999 provides that a



reference in an enactment to a repealed enactment is a reference to an enactment that replaces, or that corresponds to, the enactment repealed. This means that if such an amendment was successful, the Council would not have to follow a separate process under the Reserves Act 1977 to sell or otherwise dispose of the Reserve.

Analysis of Options

- 24. We consider that Option 2 is the preferred course of action. This is because it provides a cleaner mechanism to address the primary issue which is that the 1922 Act does not provide a power to sell the Reserve. A power of sale already exists in the 1966 Act which has been utilised in the past by way of a successful amendment to the 1966 Act in 2003. We also note that Option 2 is consistent with the purpose of the 1966 Act which is "an Act to empower the Council of the City of Palmerston North to sell and manage lands vested in it under the Palmerston North Reserves Act 1922".
- 25. Further, proceeding with Option 1 would require a two-step process the first step would be to amend the 1922 Act by way of an act of Parliament. The second step would be to follow the process set out in the Reserves Act 1977 to revoke the reserve classification, with no guarantee that the classification would in fact be revoked, given the decision on whether or not to revoke the classification is ultimately a discretionary one for the Minister of Conservation, limited by the restrictions and procedures set out in s 24 of the Reserves Act 1977. On the other hand, the sale of land under the 1966 Act requires a resolution by Council but are otherwise dependent on compliance with administrative provisions relating to notice.

The Tennis Courts

- 26. We understand that concern has arisen from the Lessees of the tennis courts during the submission process. The tennis courts are situated on the Reserve, however, the Council has not expressed any option that incorporates housing over the tennis court land. We do not consider that the amendment processes discussed above could be utilised in respect of part of the Reserve only. That is because it is recorded on one Record of Title.
- 27. However, we understand that the land on which the tennis courts are situated is currently leased. We note s 3 of the 1966 Act which provides that notwithstanding land may be vested under in the Council and no longer subject to the provisions of the 1922 Act or the Reserves and Domains Act 1953, nothing in the Act affects leases or the rights of lessees in leases issued or existing in respect of the Reserve land. This means that even if the land was brought within the ambit of the 1966 Act, the lease would remain on foot and would not be extinguished by virtue of the amendment. Further, the Council and the tennis court would be free to enter into a new lease or review the provisions of the current lease (by agreement) at an appropriate time and engage with the tennis club as necessary.

Process to Amend Legislation

28. Regardless of which option Council prefers in respect of the Reserve, in order to provide a mechanism by which the Reserve may be sold, legislative change is required – whether that is by way of an amendment to the 1922 Act or the 1966 Act. Such amendment would be by way of a local bill. Local bills deal with matters which are confined to a particular locality which is the case here.



- 29. There are specific procedures that must be followed when introducing a local bill and these are set out in the Standing Orders of the House of Representatives ("Standing Orders"). We discuss the relevant procedures below to provide an overview of the process which may serve as a roadmap as to the next steps. In practice, early engagement with both the Office of the Clerk and the local member of Parliament is key.
- 30. In most cases, the local member of Parliament will be the member responsible for a local bill once it is introduced to the House of Representatives (but they are not required to support the premise of the bill). A local bill must be promoted by a local authority. Under the Standing Orders local authority is taken to be a territorial authority or a regional council. Therefore, in this case, the Council would be the promoter. The promoter is also responsible for drafting the bill. Any bill that is presented for introduction to the House of Representatives must comply with the Standing Orders and the Parliamentary Counsel Office is able to assist with the drafting process if required.
- 31. Prior to any local bill being introduced to the House of Representatives, the Clerk of the House of Representatives must endorse the draft bill as complying with the preliminary procedures set out in the Standing Orders. Once the draft bill has been settled, the initial preliminary procedures under the Standing Orders must be followed.
- 32. The initial procedures concern public notification and require the promoter to give notice of an intention to promote a local bill. The method, relevant timeframes and form for notification are prescribed in Appendix C of the Standing Orders. In addition to public notification, the promoter must also advise persons with a direct interest in the subject matter or who may exercise any power proposed in the bill. There is a non-exhaustive list provided in the Standing Orders and we note in particular, that if the bill affects land administered under enactments relating to reserves, the Chief Executive of the responsible department must also be notified (which would be the Department of Conservation in this case).
- 33. We consider that it would also be appropriate for the Council to give notice to the lessees under any lease arrangements which currently affect the Reserve (although we note our comments above at paragraph [28] that any lease would continue even if the land was brought under the ambit of the 1966 Act). Finally, the Council would also be required to give written notice to every member of a Maori or General electoral district whose constituents may be affected by the provisions of the bill, together with proof that notice has been given. Practically, notice may be given by email, mail or hand however the bill must be made available for inspection from the date on which the notice is first published at a public library or a service centre (or both). The bill must also be made available on a website (the Council's website would suffice).
- 34. There are further requirements where the proposed bill deals with land. Where land is already held in a separate Record of Title (which is the case in respect of the Reserve), the Council will be required to obtain a certificate authorised by the Chief Executive of Land Information New Zealand which confirms that the description of the land used in the bill is correct. We are able to provide assistance with obtaining this certificate on the Council's behalf if required.
- 35. Once the above preliminary procedures have been completed, the Council must provide evidence of this by making a declaration to the House which relates to the bill. There is a



- prescribed form that must be used, and the declaration would be given by the Chief Executive on behalf of the Council. Again, we are able to provide specific assistance with this if required.
- 36. When the bill is ready to be introduced, the member of Parliament who is in charge of the bill will lodge a notice of intention to introduce the bill. The bill is introduced once notice is received, following which it will follow the ordinary parliamentary process in respect of legislation which includes a first reading, referral to select committee, second reading, committee of the whole house, third reading and finally royal assent by the Governor-General, following which the bill becomes law.
- 37. Overall, the process is likely to take at least six months, and more realistically, 12 months. Once the bill has been introduced to the House of Representatives, its progress is largely dependent its timeframes and other matters on the legislative agenda.

1. ISSUE

The Dog Control Act 1996 ("the Act") requires Council's to produce an annual report on the administration of its dog control policy and practices. This is the Palmerston North City Council report for the 2019/20 year.

2. BACKGROUND

The Act requires the following information to be provided:

- (a) the number of registered dogs in the territorial authority district;
- (b) the number of probationary owners and disqualified owners in the territorial authority district;
- (c) the number of dogs in the territorial authority district classified as dangerous;
- (d) the number of dogs in the territorial authority district classified as menacing;
- (e) the number of infringement notices issued by the territorial authority;



- (f) the number of dog related complaints received by the territorial authority in the previous year and the nature of those complaints; and,
- (g) the number of prosecutions taken by the territorial authority under this Act.

Attached is the report on Council's administration of its Dog Control Policy and practices for 2019/20.

The total number of complaints or investigations relating to barking and unattended roaming dogs continues to trend down, which in part is due to a reduction in service during level 3 and 4 of Covid-19.

A total of 2,924 complaints or investigations were conducted during the year. The number of reported dog attacks increased by 9% from last year, however it is still 5% below the five-year average. The most significant source of complaint was in relation to roaming or uncontrolled dogs (44%) followed by barking dogs (25%). The number of barking dog complaints received by Council increased by 4.6% from the previous year.

Due to the systematic follow up of un-registered dogs, infringement numbers are up on the last year.

An MPI audit of the PNCC dog pound was conducted in early March 2020. As a result of this audit, additional improvements were made to the security and safety of the individual kennels, as well as painting the roof of the pound to mitigate heat in the summer months.

Annual Section 10A Dog Control Act Report to Secretary of Local Government, 2019/2020

PALMERSTON NORTH CITY COUNCIL

This report has been prepared to satisfy the requirements of Section 10A of the Dog Control Act 1996 ('the Act').

The report covers the 2019/20 financial year.

Policy on Dogs

In August 2019 the Council heard submissions on a proposed amendment to the Dog Control Policy 2018 in relation to changing the dog control area for public places from being a prohibited public place to on-leash control in the Central Business District (CBD). Sixty-five submissions were received with 20% opposing the proposed policy amendments and 80% supporting the amendments.

Key reasons cited for opposition were:

- · safety concerns
- · the availability of other public places to walk dogs
- concern about dog faeces not being disposed of correctly
- that until Council's general approach to dog control improves, problem dog behaviour will negatively impact on everyone including allowing dogs in the CBD.

Main reasons cited for supporting the amendment were:

- enhanced social opportunities
- increased CBD vibrancy
- · enabling more dog walking opportunities
- a more permissive approach that is becoming more common in other cities
- · success of the trial
- benefits to people visiting the City.

Council supported the amendments to the policy and gave effect to them through amendments to the Dog Control Bylaw, and these were adopted by Council in September 2019.

Accommodation

The Animal Control Office is located in the Palmerston North City's central administration building situated on The Square in central Palmerston North. The Council Pound is located at Totara Road Palmerston North, at the back of the racecourse adjacent to the wastewater treatment plant. This facility has kennelling for 36 dogs and 6 puppies, with an administration area and exercise yard.

An MPI audit was conducted in early March of 2020. As a result of this audit additional improvements were made to the security and safety of the individual kennels as well as painting the roof of the pound to mitigate heat in the summer months.

The Animal Control team is based within the Customer Unit and reports to the Head of Environmental Protection Services. The Senior Animal Control Officer resigned in March 2019 and in order to better reflect the increased focus on education this position was subsequently changed to that of Team Leader, Animal Management and Education, with this role being filled by the incumbent in September 2019. Supporting the Team Leader are three experienced Animal Management Officers and a Kennel Manager/Education Officer.

Education

As of 1 February 2019, the role of Kennel Manager/Education Officer came into effect. Since December 2019 there have been two (2) education programs developed: one for primary and intermediate aged school children and one for high school children and adults. However due to the Covid-19 lockdown there was no uptake from local schools for this program. Consequently, discussions with Wild Base Recovery Centre and Library are underway to explore the opportunities for a collaborative approach.

Hours of Operation

Officers work on a roster system which provides for an Officer to be on duty from 7am to 6pm on weekdays. After hours services are limited to responding to dog attacks, secured dogs, aggressive dogs and roaming dogs. These services are provided by a contractor.

The Pound is open to the public between 8.30am - 9.30am and 2.00pm - 4.30pm Monday to Friday. The emergency release of animals outside of these hours is available, but subject to an additional fee.

Dog Registration

There were 9,193 dogs registered in 2019/20 to 7,188 owners. This is an increase of 5.2% in registered dogs from the previous year.

Fees

The Palmerston North City Council has fee categories for general registration, approved preferred owners and rural working dogs with discounted fees for general registration and de-sexed dogs. Disability assist and special working dogs do not attract fees.

Fees and charges under the Dog Control Act 1996 are reviewed annually. As of 1 July 2020, there was an increase of 5% on average for the categories of general registration, general registration de-sexed and the rural working dog and a decrease by 7.6% for preferred owner.

Overall this increase was driven by the removal of three registration categories: preferred owner de-sexed, rural non-working and rural non-working de-sexed. The catalyst for these changes was a desire to extend the preferred owner scheme to rural owners and to simplify the registration categories.

Dog registration fees, fines and impound fees contributed 77% of the cost of animal control in Palmerston North City in 2019/20. This is down 15% on last financial year partly due to some one-off expenditure relating to the reactive works done at the pound highlighted by the MPI audit, and consultation fees for the new shelter.

Preferred Owners

The financial benefit of being a preferred owner (PO) is a reduction in fees. In order to qualify as a PO, the dog owner must;

- Have had the dog registered for the last 12 months,
- Provide a satisfactory secure environment in respect to fencing, sleeping quarters and exercise space,
- Demonstrate an understanding of basic dog welfare and owners' obligations,
- Have less than one dog impounded or found roaming in the last 12 months,

- Have less than one substantiated complaint about their dog(s) in the last 12 months and
- · Have paid dog registration fees on time.

In 2018/19 there were 3094 preferred dog owners which increased by 22.7% in 2019/20 to 3.799.

In March 2020, changes were made to the structure of registration categories allowing all dog owners to be eligible for the PO scheme. The scheme is in its final stages of review and will be implemented in the 2020/21 year.

Complaints

A total of 2924 complaints or investigations were conducted during the year, which continued the downward trend. The number of reported dog attacks increased by 9% from last year however it is still 5% below the five-year average. The most significant source of complaint was in relation to roaming or uncontrolled dogs (44%) followed by barking dogs (25%). The number of barking dog complaints received by Council increased by 4.6% from the previous year.

Impounded dogs

In 2019/20 380 dogs were impounded compared to 500 for the 2018/19 year. Of these 274 (72.1%) were returned to their owner, 51 (13.4%) were euthanized and 45 (11.8%) were rehomed or transferred to the SPCA or other such rehoming agency. The remaining 2.6% were dogs that were entered in error with one dog awaiting an outcome. This is comparative to the 2018/19 figures which saw 15.2% dogs euthanized and 10.2% rehomed with other agencies.

Dog attacks

There were 96 reported dog attacks during the year, 25 of these were attacks on a person. 17 were assessed as minor, eight moderate and none serious. There were 39 attacks on other dogs, with 30 assessed as minor, six as moderate and three as serious. There were 32 attacks on other animals, with 17 assessed as minor, 12 as moderate and three as serious.

Infringements

Council continued to focus on ensuring that all known dogs were registered. Infringements were issued to multiple offenders and in some cases, dogs were impounded. In 2019/20 341 infringement notices were issued for unregistered dogs, failing to have a dog under control or confined or dogs not microchipped. Of the 341 infringements issues, 114 (33.4%) were waived or cancelled for compliance or due to extenuating circumstances.

Menacing dog classification appeals

During the year no objections to classification of dogs under section 33A were heard by the Councils Hearing Committee.

Prosecutions

There have been no prosecutions brought before the courts in the 2019/20 year.

Customer Satisfaction

A customer satisfaction survey for the 2019/20 year found 59.5% satisfied/very satisfied with the animal management service, while 26% were neither satisfied or dissatisfied, 11% were somewhat dissatisfied and 3.5% very dissatisfied. The survey had 500 respondents from across the city.

Improvement Opportunities

The Team Leader Animal Management and Education was employed and commenced on 9 September 2019. In March 2020 the councillors agreed that a new animal shelter be constructed. Stage one, design and consent requirements are to commence in July 2020, with stage two, construction to commence in July 2021.

Community Outreach and Education

The Animal Management team attended three community events this year, where they engaged the public regarding Council's Animal Management program. Events attended were;

- · Linton Family Day
- · Rural Day in the Square
- Esplanade Open Day

2020/21 Programme

Some additional points of focus are:

- Contributing to the designing and development of the new animal shelter in order to
 ensure that it is fit for purpose and is compliant with the Code of Welfare: Temporary
 Housing of Companion Animals.
- Deliver animal control education in order to improve animal welfare, owner behaviour and the public's understanding of how to safely behave around dogs.

Appendix 1: Dangerous and Menacing Dog Details

<u>Dog Control Act 1996 S 31 – Dangerous Dogs</u>

Section 31 requires the territorial authority to classify a dog as a dangerous dog if:

- the owner of the dog has been convicted of an offence in relation to dog attack;
- the territorial authority has reasonable grounds to believe that the dog constitutes a threat to the safety of any person, stock, poultry, domestic animal, or protected wildlife; or,
- the dog owner admits in writing that the dog constitutes a threat to the safety of any person, stock, poultry, domestic animal, or protected wildlife.

Dog Control Act 1996 S 33A - Menacing Dogs

Section 33A menacing dogs are dogs that have not been classified as a dangerous dog but the territorial authority considers may pose a threat to any person, stock, poultry, domestic animal, or protected wildlife because of any observed or reported behaviour of the dog or any characteristics typically associated with the dog's breed or type.

Note: American Pit Bull Terrier type and Dogo Argentino's are by default classified as menacing under section 33c (Breed and breed type) of the Dog Control Act but as the behaviour of some individual dogs was of concern then the classification for menacing was changed to Section 33A (behaviour). This was to ensure that all officers were aware that the dog(s) in question had temperament problems.

<u>Dog Control Act 1996 S 33C – Menacing Dogs</u>

Under section 33CA the territorial authority must classify as menacing any dog that the territorial authority has reasonable grounds to believe belongs wholly or predominantly to 1 or more of the following breeds or types:

- Brazilian Fila
- Dogo Argentino
- Japanese Tosa
- Perro de Presa Canario
- American Pit Bull Terrier Type






