Michael Saywell, Managing Director of Design School made a presentation to the Committee regarding supporting young people in employment training opportunities in Palmerston North.

Mr Saywell spoke about how a programme was set up for talented youth who could not get into courses as they did not have the correct qualifications. Design School then gave them the opportunity to train them for future employment. The statistics for long term employment outcomes for graduate students are on average 45% for employment in New Zealand and 35% of employment overseas. The courses run from six months to two years.

### Update on International Relations Activity

### Palmerston North City Council - Economic Development Committee Monday 12 February 2018

This report provides an update on International Relations activities and outcomes managed through the Palmerston North City Council (PNCC) international relations office, over the past 6 months.



### International activities overview

### Missoula, Montana, United States of America (since 1982)

### What we've been up to:

- In November 2017 PNCC hosted a welcome lunch for a visiting US Friendship Force delegation, including 8 visitors from Missoula, staying with local Manawatu Friendship Force hosts.
- To commemorate the recent 35<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Missoula/Palmerston North Sister City relationship, Mayor Grant Smith and the President of the Missoula Friendship Force Chapter also planted a Pohutukawa tree at Missoula Reserve and held an Esplanade visit and heritage session.
- During the same week, PNCC arranged a visit from US Ambassador, Scott Brown, to reinforce our US links. The visit included engagements with BCC, the Manawatu Chamber of Commerce and the Mayor's office, as well as the wider region of Manawatu and Rangitikei.

### Where we're going:

- Continuing to build our relationship with the US Embassy;
- The Mayor of Missoula has extended his thanks for hosting the visitors and intention to grow Sister City activities with Palmerston North.

### Guiyang, Guizhou Province, China - Sister City (since 1992)

### What we've been up to :

• Following the Mayoral-led mission to Guiyang in July 2017,

### Where we're going:

Continue to work

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Palmerston North's relationship with our Chinese Sister City has continued to grow.

- Economic cooperation: Guiyang authorities are particularly keen
  to advance economic cooperation with Palmerston North. They
  are keen to set up an information centre in Guiyang that will
  promote education, tourism and business opportunities, centered
  on our Sister City relationship and Central New Zealand.
- PNCC recently hosted a delegation from the China (Guizhou)
   International Alcoholic Beverage Expo Committee which is
   similarly keen to help boost New Zealand's food and beverage
   profile through their high-profile annual expo.
- Education: Massey University and UCOL have both seen a growth in activity as a result of the 2017 delegation visit, including proposed research trips (Massey) and the signing of new vocational training partnership MOUs (UCOL). PNCC continues to work with UCOL to develop the application process for the 25 \$10,000 scholarships, announced during the 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary visit, which will attract tertiary students from Guiyang to Palmerston North.
- closely with counterparts in Guiyang, CEDA, the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Trade, and NZ Trade and Enterprise to advance practical economic cooperation opportunities with Guiyang;
- Implement the Guiyang 25th anniversary scholarships application process with UCOL and Guiyang City authorities.

### Kunshan, Suzhou Region, China, Friendship City (since 1996)

### What we've been up to:

- In July 2017 Mayor Grant Smith led a day visit to Kunshan the first Palmerston North Mayoral delegation visit in 13 years – which has revived the Friendship City relationship.
- In late November 2017, Duke Kunshan University (DKU) offered a
  full undergraduate scholarship to a student from Palmerston
  North, based on our Friendship City relationship. The PNCC
  International Relations Office worked to identify a suitable
  candidate who managed to apply by the deadline.
- More information on page 5 of this report.

### Where we're going:

 Continuing to support the scholarship candidate who, if successful, is keen to also act as a Palmerston North Friendship City youth 'ambassador' in Kunshan.

### Mihara, Hiroshima, Japan - friendly relations (informal)

### What we've been up to:

- Following the Mayoral-led visit to Mihara in July 2017, we have worked to advance a number of key cooperation areas:
- Emergency management: Mihara City is sending their Crisis

### Where we're going:

 Coordinating the visit programme for the PNCC/Mihara

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Management Supervisor to Palmerston North in March 2018, where they will spend time with the PNCC Emergency Management Team and take part in the Massey Emergency Management Summer Institute Course. A member of the PNCC Emergency Management team will later reciprocate this learning exchange.

- **Education:** Since the July visit, both the International Director and lead Japanese teacher of St Peter's College, Palmerston North, have separately visited Mihara to discuss possible exchange programmes.
- At least two additional Palmerston North primary schools have indicated an interested in a "sister school" skype connection with Japanese primary schools in Mihara, in addition to the existing link between Terrace End and Sagiura Primary Schools.

- Emergency Management Officer Exchange;
- Continuing to support international education initiatives with Mihara;
- Assessing progress in order to provide future advice to Council on possible steps/options around formal friendship city status.

### Wageningen, Gelderland, The Netherlands - Strategic Partner City (under deliberation)

### What we've been up to:

- Initial Sister City discussions evolved into a proposal for a Strategic City Partnership, focussed on supporting cooperation between our food tech sectors. We are currently working with Wageningen to build a solid case to support this proposal.
- PNCC has received letters of support from the Vice Chancellor of Massey University and Chair of the Food HQ Board in favour of a strategic city partnership.
- Wageningen City Council is also anticipating letters of support from Wageningen University and Research (WUR) and Food Valley in the near future.

### Where we're going:

The President of WUR
is set to lead a
delegation to

### Domestic activities overview

### 2<sup>nd</sup> New Zealand China Mayoral Forum

From 4-5 December 2017, a Palmerston North delegation, including Mayor Grant Smith, PNCC CEO Heather Shotter and PNCC International Relations Manager Toni Grace, attended the second New Zealand China Mayoral Forum (NZCMF) – the first one to be held in New Zealand (Wellington).

Palmerston North was one of the core cities at the table, recognising our participation in the Forum since its inception. Key themes of the 2017 NZCMF included education, tourism and primary industries.



Mayor Grant Smith presented to the Forum on "Entrepreneurial and career-ready education in Palmerston North". Due to this education platform, the Palmerston North delegation included the Chief Executive of CEDA, the International Relations Director of Massey University and the Executive Director, Business Development from UCOL.

The Forum was a valuable opportunity to raise the profile of Palmerston North with prominent Chinese Mayors and business leaders, without the expectation of forming new formal friendship city partnerships. It also allowed the delegation to talk to other leaders in the central New Zealand region about the opportunity to work closer together in China for collective impact.

Key outcomes from the 2017 NZCMF:

- Validated Palmerston North's seat at the main speakers' table for the NZCMF;
- Successfully presented Palmerston North's strengths in international education;
- Identified several valuable New Zealand-based China business contacts and opportunities;
- Reconfirmed our strategic focus of building on existing partnerships in Southwest China (Guiyang, Guizhou), and allowed us to discuss opportunities with regional partners.

### Sister Cities New Zealand Regional Forum

PNCC is preparing to host a regional Sister Cities Forum on 23 March 2018, in conjunction with CEDA and Sister Cities New Zealand. The forum will bring together key representatives from central New Zealand cities, districts and economic development agencies for a practical discussion about best-practice and collaboration on international relations.

The forum will also include central NZ government agencies and members of the diplomatic corps, bringing a range of valuable perspectives to the table. Discussion topics include the changing nature of local government international relations, as well as targeted discussions about upcoming opportunities in business, tourism, international education and sport (including joint Education New Zealand missions, the 2019 China New Zealand Year of Tourism, and 2019 Japan Rugby World Cup).

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### **International Relations Highlights:**

### Melbourne trip leads to Blockbit company visit and establishment in Palmerston North

While attending the Australasia China Cities Summit and Business Forum in September 2017<sup>1</sup> the Mayoral-led Palmerston North delegation met Reeanjou Ram, CEO and Founder of Australian Company BlockBit Technology Solutions. Blockbit provides services across Australasia and the Asia-Pacific based on blockchain technology, and had been researching different cities to set up a New Zealand branch at the time of the meeting.

The Palmerston North delegation spoke to Ms Ram about the benefits and advantages of doing business here, and convinced her to follow up with a business scoping visit. CEDA has since worked closely with Blockbit to help establish its new development team in Palmerston North, which is expected to bring at least 25 jobs to the city by the end of 2018. Ms Ram decided on Palmerston North over other New Zealand cities as she could see it was an emerging, but still affordable, tech hub with access to research and development centres and skilled graduates.

This case highlights the valuable opportunities that can emerge out of active participation in international meetings and events, and the benefits of PNCC and CEDA working together to attract international businesses to the city.

### Day visit to Kunshan leads to generous scholarship offer for Palmerston North

As part of the PNCC Mayoral-led business delegation to China in July 2017, the International Relations Office arranged a visit to Kunshan, Palmerston North's Friendship city since 1996. Until this time, PNCC had not actively engaged with Kunshan in over a decade and there was little communication. The Palmerston North visit was warmly welcomed by the Mayor of Kunshan, who signalled he was particularly keen to establish cooperation on education. During the visit, the delegation had a tour of the modern, purpose-built Duke Kunshan University (DKU), Duke University's first Sino-US campus.

In late November 2017, DKU offered at least one full 4-year undergraduate scholarship to eligible students from Palmerston North, due to our Friendship City relationship with Kunshan. This is a generous scholarship, with annual tuition fees at DKU of approximately \$53,000USD per year, or \$212,000 USD over the four-year degree (almost \$300,000 NZD total). The PNCC International Relations Office worked with prospective applicants over the summer and assisted a Palmerston North candidate to apply by the January deadline.

This case highlights the benefits that can come from actively nurturing our international city partnerships, and investing the time and resources to maintain them through both visits and regular communication.

Following the establishment of the international relations office in October 2016, PNCC has hosted over 30 international visits or meetings.
