Comment or suggested improvement	I think that in the Koromiko Ave- Wharenui Tce-Rangiora Ave area as pictured, people often travel at 30km/hr anyhow, as the windy streets, some quite narrow, almost force careful drivers to use a lower speed for safety reasons. However, I am concerned at how confusing it will be across the city when speed limits go up and down. It will be quite hard to be certain about what the speed limit actually is.  Also, I understand why you would limit speeds when schools are going in or coming out each day, but surely to lower limits all the time is overkill.		
Do you have any other suggestions or comments to make?	Another issue in this area is that there are often cars parked even over the footpath, which makes things hazardous at times for pedestrians, and also especially those in the area who use motorised wheelchairs of different kinds. With new intensified housing proposed by Kainga Ora in this neighbourhood, it will be important that enough off-road parking is provided for tenants so that the road does not become even more hazardous with parked cars.  By the way, in your description of the Terrace End area, you say "Rangiora Terrace" when it is actually named Rangiora Avenue.

Thank you very much for the email.

No thank you, I do not wish to speak at this time.

However, I was doing some further thinking about the safer speed limit and wondered if it should be extended to include outside daycare and kindergarten centres not just schools and perhaps even extended to include shopping areas (where there is a high volume of people and cars driving around). E.g. driving around the square we are not normally near 50km/h and more likely at 30km/h already.

I am not opposed to dropping the speed limit to 30km/hr but do believe some streets need to be only during certain hours of the day. I do wonder if cost is a factor in making the decision as a metal permanent sign would cost less than having an electronic sign that needs to change speeds at certain times of the day.

I do believe that the council does need to look at the crash data and safety improvements made in the past 10 years to see if a decrease in crashes has occurred since safety improvements have been made. This could influence whether a street needs to be 30km/h permanently or only around peak volume times.



The proposal will likely route more traffic along Pitama Rd to its intersection with College Street, since otherwise there is further to travel within the proposed 30km/hr zone along Dittmer Drive. This Pitama Rd / College Street intersection (which is in a shopping area) is already a bottleneck (as is the Maxwell's Line / Pioneer Highway intersection further north-west.).  Would it be possible to look at a roundabout or traffic lights at the Pitama Rd / College Street intersection. The intersections at Katene St / Park Road and Ruha St / Park Road also clog at busy periods, as does the Wikiriwhi Terrace / Botanical Road intersection at start and end of school at Awatapu College. Comment or suggested improvement	Both the timing, extents and speed limits of this proposal are important to make it safe for my son and his friends to walk, scooter or cycle to school safely (Central Normal School in this case). It also allows the residential area around the school to be more pleasant for non-car based transport and makes it more likely that ourselves and our neighbours will walk or cycle in the area or into town. 30km/h is the best speed to balance mobility and safety in the area, as it allows different modes of transport to operate safely with only a minimum effect on vehicle travel time. To emphasise this, over a 1km length of road (which is a conservatively long estimate of the likely length of a school zone), reducing the speed from 50km/h to 30km/h adds a little over 48 seconds in travel time assuming that the vehicle can even do 50km/h in a urban area during peak times (40km/h is a more likely maximum speed which only adds 30 seconds to travel time). Any argument that this would effect "productivity" is laughable at best and duplicitous at worse. If you drove past all 35 schools in Palmerston North, it would only add 30min which is unlikely in the extreme. As a resident of Argyle Ave, I am happy to see my street drop permanently to 30km/h as this speed is both safe and appropriate.
Do you have any other suggestions or comments to make?	Widening the existing school speed zone around Central Normal School to include Argyle, Guy, Aroha Streets etc is not only necessary for the safety of students at all three schools, but is vital to the success of the Featherston Street Safety Upgrades also proposed in the area. Without the lower limit on these streets, these roads are likely to become a 'ratrun' for drivers avoiding the slower zone on Featherston Street. Speed limit are part of the solution for to mitigate rat-runs in the residential area. We also suggest that physical infrastructure is considered on these roads to "engineer" the lower speed limit down to what is posted.  We would prefer no speed humps on the through routes and chicanes employed instead (loss of parking on street is not a real issue for most residents, but the noise generated by humps would be). Pedestrian ramps (flat top humps) COULD be used however at the entries to this zone and this would control speed at the key locations (pedestrians desire lines) and support their crossing movements. Ramps at the Rangitikei Street, Aroha and Wood Street approaches would work well and support walking in the area.

	We would also like to note that there are vehicles using Argyle Ave (also Havill St where we used to live) who routinely exceed the current speed limit. #### 1. Rugby St VSL

I would question the rationale of making Rugby St a VSL area. On Page 5 of the Palmerston North Interim Speed Management Plan it is stated that "... in most cases where a school is accessed from a main route.... "It also states on page 26 "We propose a 30kmh VSL on Rugby Street outside the entrance of Awapuni School for a 500 m stretch." There is NO access from Awapuni School directly to Rugby Street. The far corner of the school's playing field is contiguous with Rugby St for only 50 metres and is separated by a continuous steel fence. Although the boundary is only 50 metres long you intend to make the VSL area 500 metres, ten times that amount!

Access to the school is actually from Rochester Street and Dampier Avenue

#### 2 <u>Dampier Avenue</u>

I live in Dampier Avenue about 100 metres from the "back gate" of Awapuni School. If reducing the speed limit to 30 kmh is in regard to the safety of children <u>on foot</u> accessing the rear entrance <u>that</u> is a good thing.

I understand another reason for according Dampier Ave the 30kmh status is in relation to car parking/queuing for parental "Pick-up/Drop-off". I have lived in this street for the past 51 years and I cannot recall an occasion where there has been any traffic congestion or vehicle queue caused by this. Thus Pick-up/Drop off is an invalid argument here but has some cogency in respect of the 30 kmh limit being placed on Wyndham, Oban, Wainui and Raleigh streets for if there is no parking congestion in Dampier Avenue there is unlikely to be any further away from the school. I exclude Alexander Street because I do not know of any impact the Kindergarten has in this regard.

If the safety of children on foot is the prime consideration then to be consistent you should impose a 30 kmh restriction on streets on the North side of Rugby Street as well – children go to school from those streets too.

As a resident of Parkland Crescent on and off since 1976 I have seen enormous changes in the way that students arrive at school and negative behaviors of drivers. In the 1970's most children walked to school, accompanied by their parents. However, by the time that I purchased the house from my mother's estate and have lived permanently in the street in 1997, most children attending the school and the kindergarten arrive by car. There is a significantly different flow of traffic over the dropoff/pick up periods of the day to the road usage at any other time. The living room of my house has an excellent view of one of the approaches to the school/kindergarten entrance on Parkland Crescent, and frankly the behavior of parents/caregivers on the roadway is appalling. They park over my driveway, which is marked by a dotted yellow line, they park on the roadway outside my house, and do not pay good attention to other peoples cars or children, they walk their children across the roadway, rather than the footpath, they park well withing 6m of the bus stop sign. On the occasions when I drive my car past the school at pick up and drop of times other drivers do not give way to traffic driving up the hill, although this may be because their line of sight is obscured by parked cars. In summary, driver behavior from 8am to 8:50 and 2.30pm to 3pm is a 'shitshow'. I would support parking and traffic management staff completing a programme of observation and development of practical actions to improve safety in the street during peak school periods without making the street unusable at other times - keeping in mind that it is also a bus route. Council staff would be welcome to observe from my home if they wished to be invisible to the public.

However, I was very dismayed to be driving up Ruahine St recently, wondering why cars appeared to be bouncing in the middle of the road, and discovered a judder bar, half the size of the great north face of Everest, has been erected on a busy thoroughfare. To be honest, even knowing the judder bar has the pedestrian crossing on it, I am more distracted by figuring out how to negotiate this enormous mound, than checking for people using the crossing. School children attend school 5 days per week, 40 weeks per year for a total of 200 days per year. My experience of Parkland Cres suggests that there is a time slot of about 45 minutes in the morning, and 30 or less in the afternoon when they are actively arriving or leaving, mostly by car. It appears to be an enormous disruption to traffic on a road that not only leads to one of the few rail crossings in the town, but more importantly to the hospital, to provide what may be dubious protection for what is a small proportion of the time that the roadway is in use by school children.  I would like to respectfully request that the council carefully monitor traffic behaviour around these new crossings (Vogel St and Fairs Road are also regularly on my travel routes) to consider if they are providing more safety than hazard. I am perfectly happy to follow the 30km speed limit around schools during peak times, and have no objection to the solar powered flashing signs. In fact I find myself changing my speed around schools that don't yet have reduced speed limits.

People regularly drive upwards of 80km/h through my street which has a 50km/h speed limit. I Want my area to be safer for children attending the local school, and my own child. However, I believe that lowering the speed limit is the wrong approach to solving this issue, as people regularly disregard the speed limit anyway.  Speed bumps are more effective at reducing vehicle speeds than simply lowering the speed limit. This is because speed bumps provide a physical obstacle that requires drivers to slow down, whereas a lowered speed limit relies on voluntary compliance from drivers. Studies have shown that speed bumps can reduce vehicle speeds by up to 25% compared to a 5% reduction for a lowered speed limit. A well-designed and maintained speed bump can effectively reduce speeds and improve road safety. If child safety were truly the main concern the roads in this area would be better maintained. A study (Wong et al 2013) has found that child pedestrians on poorly maintained roads were three times as likely to be injured compared to those on well-maintained roads. The study examines the impact of roadway conditions on child pedestrian injuries in New Zealand and found that poorly maintained roads also increase the severity of child pedestrian injuries. I have been waiting for the council to fix a pothole in Humber st since 10/3/2021 reference number is 800268.  According to the New Zealand Transport Agency (NZTA), speed bumps can be an effective way to reduce speed in areas such as schools and residential neighborhoods. The NZTA recommends using speed bumps in conjunction with other traffic calming measures, such as signage and road markings, to improve their effectiveness. However, the NZTA also notes that poorly designed or maintained speed bumps can lead to vehicle damage, noise pollution, and increased emissions. Therefore, it is important to carefully consider the placement and d



And a 60km/hr limit is supported around the school or more during school arrival and departure times. The map is unclear what length of Old West Road is proposed by Waka Kotahi with lower speeds. The side road speed change is really irrelevant as it is so short and busy. 

I have seen it all. Cars stop in the middle of the road to drop off their kids - literally stopping traffic to do so. Kids getting out of the car on the road side rather than the footpath side. Sudden u turns, speeding etc etc. Along with effective policing - could we introduce a better level of driver education and increased driver awareness of their actions?  In addition, lowering speeds may have an unexpected side effect of increasing fuel consumption and therefore a negative impact on the environment. Kiwis own a lot of ~2 MT automatic vehicles - at low speed they run in lower gears and at higher rpm = high fuel consumption. Much higher eg ~20L/100km. This 112 out of one school's data is only 0.0035% for ONE school - yet the 112 is all schools. So it's my view that proportionately, this is a very low number.  You also made mention that 16% of night crashes are near schools - the fact that these happen near schools is totally irrelevant, given that the school is empty during this time.

Comment or suggested improvement	Re intention to reduce speed limit in Savage Crescent to 30 km/hr I suggest there are alternatives to reducing the speed limit that would be more effective in Savage Crescent than reducing the speed limit. However, before addressing that point, I question the need to reduce the speed limit in Savage Crescent for the following reasons.  • I understand there was, or is, an educational institution beside Savage Park (uncertain if still in use) but my understanding is this is primarily for a small number of older children who should be aware of road safety. And crossing the road in Savage Crescent is less hazardous (narrow, limited traffic) than crossing the other roads that there is the intent to increase limits on e.g. Park, College, Botanical.  • This school is situated at a curved end of the Crescent where traffic speed can be lower than 50 km/hr anyway because of the narrow road (especially if cars parked there) and lack of visibility ahead. And if there is to be a limit for this school, then why does it need to cover the whole Crescent?  • I live on the Townshend cul-de-sac which has a walkway to Park Road. I see few children on the Crescent, including cutting through Townshend Place. Very few teenagers come through, and Townshend Place is a logical entrance for high schoolers at this end of the Crescent to enter or exit. There are a few younger children in the morning and after school (not many of these either) but the majority of these are accompanied by a parent: it is rare to see a younger child on their own. Similarly on weekends, younger children tend to be with family.  • The majority of traffic on the Crescent will be residents and their friends and family. Savage Crescent is not an obvious through Street with high traffic volumes. Unlike other roads with schools where this is proposed, school hours have little or no impact on the Savage Crescent traffic.  • I also question whether a reduced speed limit will be effective in reducing speed.  • I believe the majority of the traffic in Savage Crescent do

	on the side of road and the narrowness of the road means that traffic is effectively one way in that situation. Residents, who will be the main users of the street, will all be aware of this.  • The is no traffic control in the street, so reducing speed limit is unlikely to have any impact unless other measures are also adopted e.g. permanent speed cameras. I hear police sirens in College, Botanical and Park. But the only time we see a police car in Savage Crescent is if they are in there following up an incident or some other business.  • Consequently, the majority of responsible citizens will continue to drive safely (albeit slightly over 30 km/hr). The 'hoons' that we get in the Crescent periodically, day and night, will continue to speed through the street (often with excessive motor noise) regardless of speed limit which they already exceed: a reduction in speed limit will not alter their behaviour especially since they know they are highly unlikely to get pulled up for it. Some of this driving is quite dangerous.  Possible alternative  • I suggest a few strategically placed judder bars (perhaps on the straight parts) would be more effective in limiting the speed of the traffic in the Crescent, and discourage those travelling at excess speeds, including making the Crescent less attractive to hoons. Alternatively, greater and more regular police monitoring will need to be implemented to make a reduced speed limit effective which is unlikely given police availability. Or speed cameras.



# Submission Draft Palmerston North Interim Speed Management Plan (School Speed Limits)

We generally support this Draft Speed Management Plan as outlined in the consultation document and its alignment with proposals from Waka Kotahi.

We are happy to support the reduction of speed limits around most schools, with permanent 30 km/h speed limits in side streets surrounding schools as proposed. We also support variable speed limits down to 30 km/h where roads outside schools interface with State Highways. Rural schools may well have a case for higher speed limits.

We think that there may be further need to extend the permanent 30 km/h speed limits to more streets in the vicinity of schools as a result of local knowledge.

Ideally we would like to a city-wide reduction in the speed limit for all vehicles, including motor cycles and E-scooters, to a maximum of 40 km\h, but presumably this is a matter for a future review. Speed reductions will not cause a massive reduction in economic activity as some people seem to think. Lower traffic speeds will make living in urban areas more pleasant and less stressful.

#### A double Tragedy – a Reason for Speed Reductions

In this modern age speed limits for vehicles passing stationary school buses has been reduced to 20 km/h. So reduced speed limits around schools should also be mandatory. Marilyn has a memory of a fellow school bus passenger being dropped off by the bus on a busy highway. Usually his mother waited at the bus stop, but on this day she was on the other side of the road outside her house. This boy ran across the road to his mother and was hit by a truck and was killed. Some months later the truck driver committed suicide. This tragic incident occurred in the late 1950's.

#### A Near Miss

In the late 1990's Marilyn was driving a small Toyota car. She rounded the corner from Church Street into Cook Street. She sighted a mother and two young children standing on the median strip waiting to cross the road. All of a sudden, one of these children, a boy aged about 9 years, dashed across the road into the path of the car. Out of the corner of here eye Marilyn saw the mother gasp in horror as the waiting mother witnessed this unfolding event. Fortunately Marilyn was travelling quite slowly, maybe 20 km/h, and was able to brake in time. Had the car been driven at a greater speed and the car much larger and heavier, the outcome of this incident may well have been tragic.

We do not wish to speak to our submission.

We're happy with the 40kph around schools at variable times as they are at present. We support making it 30kph only if there is evidence to support the need (see below) but do NOT support 30kph on a permanent basis or any reduction being imposed beyond school exits.  Other than compliance, what's the driver for change? How many of the accidents in the last 10 years were since the speed dropped to 40kph around school zones? Did that change reduce accidents? How many accidents since then have been due to vehicles passing the school as school started/finished - rather than vehicles pulling out from parking or occurred coincidentally near a school? And of them, how many were impacted by the speed of the vehicle? There's a real question needing to be answered of just how much difference a slower speed for all road users would have made in those cases?  Are there particular schools with particularly poor records? Rather than impose restrictions on all, consider those that it would make a significant difference to.  No-one should assume a lower speed limit makes the road 'safe'. There is no such thing as a safe speed limit. Any speed brings risk. We shouldn't pretend we can eliminate it all. Attempting to will come at a cost to the majority who are good drivers and instinctively slow when they see kids coming out of school.  There are some in society that a lower speed limit will make no to difference anyway - and some that will simply be annoyed and either continue to speed through or accelerate hard as soon as they are beyond the limited area - which could be a greater hazard.  We reluctantly would support a 30kph speed around school gates before and after school (maybe half an hour each side of those times - 2 hours/per day and only in school term) but emphatically do NOT support ongoing speed reduction at all, nor speed reductions in residential areas without school access.  The wider areas propose	



	kids walked and biked from Botanical Road to St Peter's for years.  A safety improvement (that I asked for when our kids were at that school) would be to add cycle lights to the traffic lights near the schools - similar to that at Ruahine/Featherston St. That would be a great safety improvement - especially at Tremaine/Rangitikei and probably College/Fitzherbert. There are probably other intersections that would benefit from them too.  We suggest, where possible, entrances to schools should be altered to avoid main arterial roads - e.g. central normal could close off their Featherston St exit to make it safer. Not all schools would have that option, but many do.  It remains important to teach people (especially kids) about road safety. A safe-ish bubble at school without having to consider other road users will not make them safe adults in later life. Learning to look and listen remains an important life skill. Nor should people have the view that there's a slower speed limit so I'm safe. That is simply not true.

Comment or suggested improvement	It is simply unrealistic to expect that a 30km/h permanent speed limit on Park Road will be complied with. You cannot simply put up a speed limit sign and expect drivers to comply with it. I drive through this area regularly, I would suggest Councillors drive through the area at 30km/h and see for themselves just how unrealistic it is. It is so far from the school that drivers will not perceive any danger at school times, let alone late at night or in holiday periods. I would support a VSL if it is thought necessary, however the kea crossing works just fine.

Do you have any other suggestions or comments to make?	I am very supportive of sensible changes to speed limits around schools. Variable limits have proven very effective, reducing speeds at key times and reducing crashes over the ten years since they were implemented. But some crashes have still happened, even though speeds have reduced.  In the consultation document the following claim is made: "there are no parts of the network where pedestrians cyclists or buses receive priority over vehicles." This simply isn't true, pedestrians have a whole, separated network of footpaths and pedestrians crossings where they are given priority by vehicles. Cars do not drive on footpaths, must give way when they exit a driveway and must give way at a pedestrian crossing. The key locations where speeds need to be reduced are thus those crossing points at schools. This can and is managed well, few accidents happen on formed crossing points at schools.	



I understand the desire to see speeds reduced, surveys confirm that speeds do actually reduce at school times. In fact, speed is seldom a factor in pedestrian accidents near schools. If you look at the cover photo on the consultation document it stands out that it is the volume of traffic, not the speed that is of concern. You only need to watch a school pedestrian crossing on a busy road, they key safety issue is not speed but volume and traffic density, waiting for a gap in traffic. These changes will do nothing to address that problem, if anything lowering travel speeds will increase traffic density as it tends to compress traffic flows as faster traffic catch up to those travelling at low speed. There is a distinct possibility that these changes will in some cases make journeys less safe, pedestrians tend to make hurried judgements and take risks when wait times are increased.

I have worked in the transport industry for over 40 years. I have seen first hand how difficult it is to get drivers to slow, you only have to look at road works zones, which generally have a 30 km/h limit. Few drivers comply however, and it has been necessary to expand controls so that hundreds of cones are needed at work sites to manage speeds down. This drives up costs, often nearly half the cost of road construction projects is traffic control and there are national campaigns by people trying to get cones removed from road works sites. I fear the same will happen with school zones, when people realise that drivers have not slowed sufficiently they will demand speed humps, raised platforms and other traffic management to slow the traffic.

I am also concerned at the unintended consequences of this policy change. Where is the analysis on the impacts on passenger transport? Slower travel speeds mean that bus trips in metro areas will take longer. Will this be reflected by less services or more buses? What are the implications if car insurance companies start refusing to pay out on accident claims because drivers were ignoring posted 30 km/h speed signs? What are the impacts on freight deliveries?

A final comment on the desire to reduce speeds so cycling trips will be safer. I am a regular cyclist and for many years commuted along Palmerston North streets and arterial roads. I know that cyclists do not like vehicles travelling at "excessive" speeds. But I also know they do not like heavy traffic flows. Hence I am not convinced that simply dropping travel speeds across large parts of the network will actually increase cycling. It would be better to have permanent 40 km/h speed limits on residential roads, with 50-60 km/h limits on arterial roads. This piecemeal approach of expanded school zones will just be a nightmare for drivers to keep up with. The response is likely to be that drivers will ignore the restrictions. This is a mistake, is poor policy and I am confident it will not be the end point, in a few years there will be arguments for change.

Put in as many Variable Speeds Zones at schools as you want, I do not support permanent 30 km/h limits.

## Submission on PNCC's Draft Interim Speed Management Plan 2023 (School Speed Limits)

#### INTRODUCTION

- Congratulations PNCC on finally treating children in Palmerston North with the respect
  they all deserve. Since variable speed limits were instituted near some schools, what
  seems like a decade ago, we have had the inequitable situation of some children being
  more exposed to considerably higher risk of injury while travelling to and from their
  schools, through no fault of their own, than others. Thank you for mostly addressing this
  inequity.
- 2. Overall, I believe the proposed changes to speed limits are moving in the right direction but they are still inadequate to protect children and other pedestrians from the increasing danger they face in using our transport system. Furthermore, they maintain the unequal treatment of children attending urban and rural schools which I believe is unconscionable, perpetuating the priority given to people in vehicles over people outside of them in rural areas, contrary to the second principle, stated on p5 of the consultation document, of prioritising people over vehicles.
- 3. In the following paragraphs I will deal in detail with one particular school, College Street School, that is closest to where I live and also make suggestions or comments on the other schools for which lower speed limits are proposed.

## **COLLEGE STREET SCHOOL**

## **Side Streets**

4. During the period 16/5-24/5/2023 I counted pedestrian and cyclist movements, between 8 and 8.55am, at the intersections of College Street with Ranfurly/Union, Ada/Marne, Oxford, Morris, Milverton and Colombo/Phoenix.

- 5. These counts confirmed what I knew from living in the area that children come out of these streets to go to school and that there is a high number of pedestrian movements on, into and out of these side streets.
- 6. It is puzzling and in my view not justifiable that side streets on the south and west sides of the school, such as Kensington Mews, Karaka St and Marne St, are proposed to have permanent 30km/h speed limits (which I support) while no such limits are proposed for side streets near the school between College St and Ferguson St.
- 7. We have lived on Oxford St for 27 years and in that time at least 75% of existing dwellings have had school children living in them. Currently there are at least 11 school children and about a further 5 pre-school-aged children living here. It is likely that the same can be said of the other side streets between College and Ferguson.
- 8. Not only do school children live on these streets but many are also dropped off on them, rather than on College St, and then walk or scoot to the school, in some cases accompanied by an adult and in other cases doing so alone. This is particularly the case for Oxford and Morris streets but was also seen on Ranfurly, Ada and Milverton.
- 9. Besides children, there are many adult pedestrians using these streets. Some live slightly further away from the centre of town and walk to work or the shops or Ucol or the bus terminal. Others appear to be commuters who seem not to want to pay for parking within the central city area and who park on these streets instead. Still others are university students who are often seen walking out of these streets towards the bus stop at the corner of Fitzherbert and College.
- 10. In addition to the above, Oxford St, at least, sees a reasonable level of use by cyclists keen to get off the inner ring road or to avoid the Princess/Ferguson intersection or to go to the bike shops on the corners of Oxford, Donnington and Ferguson.
- 11. Furthermore, the southern half of Oxford St is narrow (~8m) making a lower speed limit even more appropriate.
- 12. The above factors lead me to believe that it would be appropriate to set permanent 30km/h speed limits on all of the side streets from Ranfurly through to Phoenix and I request that PNCC does so. This would also benefit all the residents of these streets. It would help to discourage the 'rat-running' traffic that they experience and make them quieter and safer for children to play outside.
- 13. These are local streets under the One Network Road Framework, and are intended, in part, to serve the transport function of allowing property owners to get to and from their properties while also providing for the other roles of the street. As local streets, NZTA considers that a safe and appropriate speed for them is 30km/h especially as they often form important parts of the walking and cycling network, as it is clear they do. They are considered to be the fabric our our local communities and this will only increase as the density of housing and the number of people living on them continues to increases over coming years which, in turn, is likely to lead to still higher pedestrian and cyclist use.



#### Length of School Speed Zone

- 14. The counts made also revealed the inadequacy of the length of the variable speed zone on College St itself, with numerous children and other pedestrians coming from or going beyond the Ranfurly/College and Phoenix/College intersections.
- 15. There is a multi-unit housing facility, Mile, a little to the west of the Fitzherbert/College intersection and many children appear to come from there. In the other direction, beyond the current location of the variable speed limit sign, children come out of Milverton, Colombo, Phoenix and beyond, as well as some houses along College St itself, to go to College St, Intermediate Normal, Boys High or Girls High schools.
- 16. Many of the children coming from these more distant locations are moving independently, without adult supervision. Some are on scooters, some walking and a considerable number were riding on the roadway to PN Intermediate Normal School. A small number were riding to Hokowhitu and St. James schools.
- 17. Many of these students, if walking, cross College Street at the intersections with the side streets rather than use the crossing outside College St School. Some do so sensibly while others, especially some of the younger ones, take undue risks in doing so.
- 18. The Safe Systems approach to road safety doesn't focus on blame but on making the road system safe. Young children are known to be impulsive and to have poor judgment of time, distance and speed and to have immature and poorly developed decision-making abilities. We need to make the roads safe for them by requiring adults driving vehicles to go more slowly.
- 19. A road controlling authority may determine the length of road covered by a school speed limit. Section 5.1 of the Setting of Speed Limits Rule 2022 states

'a road controlling authority may determine-

- (a) what sections of the road under its control are a road outside a school, having regard to-
- (i) typical or expected routes for pedestrians to access the school; and
- (ii) the purpose of making people feel safer to walk to and from school (or travel to and from school on cycles or mobility devices) and encouraging them to do so;'
- The above (paras. 14-19) leads me to request that the College St School variable speed limit along College Street be extended to the Fitzherbert/College and Victoria/College intersections.

## **Duration of School Speed Zone**

21. Not only should the school zone be extended on College St but also the duration of the time that the variable speed limit applies should be extended. I observed children proceeding to school, unaccompanied, from 8 o'clock onwards. Some may even have done so before this.

- 22. At that time, when the number of school children on the street is relatively low, drivers may not be so careful about watching out for them. Also, with the lower speed limits not in effect, drivers are likely to be going faster, increasing the danger for the children who are around. This may actually make these periods more dangerous for children than during the peak period (8.15-8.45) of children moving towards school.
- 23. I also saw children arriving at school close to 9am. Some were travelling alone while some were driven to school. It was obvious from their haste that the drivers were aware that they were late. This is exactly the sort of behaviour that increases the danger for all other road users.
- 24. A road controlling authority may determine the period of time during which a school speed limit is in effect. Section 5.1 of the Setting of Speed Limits Rule 2022 states

'a road controlling authority may determine-

(b) what are the school travel periods for a school, having regard to any guidance provided by the Agency about school travel periods'

25. So I additionally request that the duration of the variable lower speed limit along College St be extended to 8am and 9am.

## The Pedestrian Crossing

- 26. Besides the above, I also observed that the sun angle is low at the time children are going to school, posing a further danger because the low sun angle makes it more difficult for road users to see each other. Furthermore, many drivers were driving with windows partly fogged up (this is likely on winter mornings). Both factors may contribute to drivers being less able to see other road users than they would under different conditions.
- 27. The low sun angle may have been the reason I saw two instances of drivers heading east (towards Victoria Ave) failing to stop at the pedestrian crossing outside College St school despite children waiting to cross and drivers on the other side of the street (heading towards Fitzherbert Ave) having stopped, as they are legally required to do.
- 28. However, it may not be the only reason for such incompetence being shown by some drivers. On Sunday, 28<sup>th</sup> May, in the middle of the afternoon when sun angle was not an issue, my wife and I were already close to half-way across that pedestrian crossing when a large SUV was driven right through the other side of the crossing, no more than 2m in front of us.
- 29. Such non-compliance with the law concerning pedestrian crossings may reflect ignorance of the law, a disregard for pedestrians or a high level of inattentiveness none of which are justifiable excuses for people in charge of vehicles that have the ability to severely injure and kill.
- 30. Although outside the direct scope of this consultation, I request that the pedestrian crossing outside College St school be raised as has been done outside Terrace End School, Ashhurst School, outside the Vogel Street shops and perhaps at other locations. Research has found that raised pedestrian crossings are markedly safer for pedestrians



than ones that are level with the rest of the roadway. Having a raised pedestrian crossing would also assist in getting drivers to abide by the lower speed limit.

#### **Additional matters**

- 31. Besides the above, as I expect is the case for many parts of the city, the area in question is used by people with vision and other impairments. A blind woman and her young children live on Milverton St while a wheelchair user lives on College St and a modified, disability-suitable tricycle rider also frequents Marne, College, Oxford and other side streets.
- 32. I think the above provides compelling reasons for setting permanent 30km/h speed limits on the side streets from Ranfurly to Phoenix inclusive, to extend the length of the school speed zone on College St to be from Victoria Ave to Fitzherbert Ave, to extend the duration of operation of the variable speed limit on College St to be from 8am to 9am on school days and to make the pedestrian crossing outside College St School a raised one.
- 33. I would also support a permanent 40km/h speed limit along College St but that is a matter for the fuller speed management plan.
- 34. I support the proposals for Marne St, Karaka St, Kensington Mews and Park Rd.

#### **OTHER SCHOOLS**

#### Category 2 schools

- 35. There is absolutely no difference between children attending rural schools and those attending urban schools in their capacity to tolerate the physical forces involved when hit by a vehicle. On that basis alone, the speed limit outside rural schools should be the same as outside urban schools. NZTA will acknowledge this.
- 36. The reasoning used by NZTA to allow category 2 school speed limits to be set as high as 60km/h is mainly based on the view that pupils are delivered to the school by bus or car and therefore the likelihood of being hit by another vehicle is low.
- 37. That does not account for the situations where there are children living in close proximity to the school who make their own way there on foot or scooter or bicycle as is likely to be the case for many schools located in rural settlements, such as Aokautere.
- 38. Even where this is not the case, some children may sometimes be dropped off opposite the school, despite this being discouraged. That then involves them crossing the road, usually without the aid of a pedestrian crossing. And rural children can be as impulsive as urban ones and very likely have similarly poorly developed decision making and judgment skills leading to life-endangering road crossing behaviours.
- 39. Even if most children arrive at rural schools by vehicle, making the likelihood of being hit by a vehicle lower than at urban ones, if the speed at which those vehicles are travelling is 60km/h rather than 30km/h the risk to a child may be the same or even higher than for

- children attending urban schools because the consequence of a collision is so much worse at 60km/h than at 30km/h.
- 40. For these reasons, speed limits near rural schools should also be 30km/h unless there are no houses nearby, there is a spacious drop-off area on the school side of the road, and the side of the road opposite the school is a no parking zone with enforcement (such as by camera) or actually has no physical space to stop in.
- 41. Every child's life should be regarded as equally important and we should therefore take measures that will have the greatest likelihood of keeping them from harm whether they attend a rural or urban school. To do otherwise is nothing short of discriminatory.
- 42. Based on the above, I request that the proposed school speed limits
- 42.a) for Aokautere School on Staces and Fitzherbert East Roads be 30km/h variable speed limits for a distance of 500m in all directions from the entrance to Aokautere Primary School and 60km/h permanent speed limit outside of school travel times. This would tie in well with increasing the safety through Aokautere Village also and be analogous to the proposal for Longburn School, which also has an entranec along a state highway.
- for Bunnythorpe School be extended to cover Maple St, and Dixons Line as far as Raymond St, with permanent 30km/h limits and Railway Rd as far as Maple St, Kairanga-Bunnythorpe Rd as far as Cooksley Rd, and Campbell Rd from Dixons Line to Dutton St with variable 30km/h speed limits. In this extended area, there are numerous houses in which children attending the school are likely to live and the complex transport situation (high density of traffic, multiple intersections, a railway with a fence preventing children from crossing it) warrants lower speed limits.
- 42.c) for Kairanga School and Longburn Adventist College be lowered to a 30km/h variable speed limits.
- 42.d) for Turitea School to be a 30km/h permanent limit on the side road on which the entrance of the school is located and a 30km/h variable limit on Old West Rd.
- 42.e) for Whakarongo School to be a 30km/h variable speed limit on both Stoney Creek Rd and SH3.
- 43. I support the proposal for Longburn School.

## Category 1 Schools

- 44. For Ashhurst School, I support the proposals and seek no modification. The physical and regulatory changes already implemented on Cambridge Ave have made the area on that side of the school much safer and feel safer but needs to be extended to cover a greater part of the catchment from which children come to school.
- 45. For Cloverlea School, I support the proposal but request that it be extended to include a variable 30km/h on Gillespies Line from the overbridge to Benmore Ave





and permanent 30km/h limits on the streets to the west of Gillespies Line (e.g. Peters Ave). These streets are part of the catchment area for the school and the lower limits would have added benefits for residents at other times besides the school travel period. The trip to and from school needs to be safe for its entirety not just immediately around the school.

- 46. For OneSchool Global PN Campus, I **request that the school speed limit be a permanent 30km/h along Johnstone Drive**. This is because of the increasing housing in the area very likely to lead to an increase in vehicular traffic and because the Campus has an associated church which can be expected to attract traffic at other times of the week.
- 47. For Girls High School, I support the proposal but I request that the variable 30km/h limit be extended across Fitzherbert Ave along Park Road to join up with the permanent 30km/h limit proposed to start midway between Fitzherbert and Union. This will help avoid having multiple limit changes, making it more likely drivers will be aware of what the limit is. Multiple limit changes over short distances is something the public has previously expressed dissatisfaction with. Also, I request that the Fitzherbert Te Awe Awe intersection be included in the variable 30km/h zone as many students walk through it on route to and from school.
- 48. For Parkland School, I support the proposal but I request the area covered by the permanent 30km/h be extended to include Manson, Knowles and Webb and Brightwater Tce as far as Limbrick. This would include more of the catchment area, tie in well with the presence of the Brightwater Home eldercare facility and the higher proportion of young families in the area.
- 49. For Russell St School, I support the proposal but I request that Matamau, Rongopai and Florence avenues be part of the 30km/h permanent speed limit area as children are very likely to be coming from all of these to the school and if such a limit is warranted on Heretaunga St beyond Florence, as proposed, then it must surely be warranted on Florence and closer streets.
- 50. For Te Kura o Wairau/Somerset School, I support the proposal but I request the area covered by the permanent 30km/h speed limit be extended along Havelock Ave as far as Monowai PI and also include Stillwater PI. This will cover more of the catchment area and also takes account of the presence of Bill Brown Park and the Pacifica Community Centre which are significant traffic generators.
- 51. For Terrace End School, I **support the proposal** and commend the Council for the recent installation of a raised pedestrian crossing across Ruahine St. Wherever pedestrian crossings exist outside schools they should be raised ones and I **request that Council make them so**.
- 52. For the Awapuni West End School Cluster, I support the proposal but I request that
- 52.a) the variable 30km/h limit on Rugby St be extended to Raleigh St (which is fully covered by a permanent 30km/h limit)
- 52.b) a variable 30km/h limit be implemented on College St from Glen Place to Pitama Rd

- 52.c) the permanent 30km/h limit on Slacks Rd be extended as far as Buick Cres (western end) and include the side streets coming off Slacks along this stretch. If it is warranted to set a limit on Buick Cres at 30km/h, permanently, all the way to its western end ,then Slacks should also be included also the greater amount of traffic on Slacks and that we are supposed to be applying the principle of putting people first ahead of vehicles into effect.
- the proposed 30km/h variable speed limit along Park Rd be extended to Ruha St to take greater account of the catchment areas for West End School, Awatapu College, Manawatu Community College and Girls High School. I also request that the section from Ruha to Cook be made a permanent 30km/h on account of the Lido being in that section and attracting traffic and many children throughout the day and week.
- 53. For Hokowhitu School and St James School, I support the proposal but I request that the side streets along Albert St including St. Albans Ave all be have permanent 30km/h speed limits as children come from there to the school just as they do from Churchill Ave and side streets off it. I also request that College St from Victoria Ave to Albert St be made a variable 30km/h stretch for the same reason but also to tie in with the extension of the variable limit that I proposed for College St School (see para 20)since some of those school children seen coming from beyond the Phoenix/College intersection will have been coming from or via that stretch of College Street and some will be coming from or via it to reach Hokowhitu or St James School.
- 54. For Winchester School, I support the proposal but I request that Ruahine St have a variable 30km/h limit from Franklin Ave to the start of the permanent 30km/h stretch since children coming out of Salisbury or living on Ruahine St may well be using Ruahine as their route to school it should be safe.
- 55. For Mana Tamariki School, I support the proposal for a 30km/h variable speed limit along Grey St.
- 56. For Carncot School, I support the proposal for 30km/h permanent speed limits on Rangitane, Regent, Sydney and Vivian streets but I request that a permanent 30km/h limit also be instituted along Broadway from Victoria to Albert. This would not only make it safer for the children who arrive at the school through the Broadway Ave entrance but would be more in keeping with the high number of businesses along this stretch of road and frequent crossing of the street by people, in vehicles and on foot or cycle, visiting those businesses.
- 57. For Milson School and St Peter's College, I support the proposed permanent 30km/h but request that variable 30km/h limits be implemented on John F Kennedy Drive from Rennie to Langley and on Fairs Rd from Rennie to Langely to better support children arriving at school from beyond those streets.
- 58. For PN Adventist Christian School, I support the proposed permanent 30km/h limits on Snelson, Cleland, McGiffert and Ferguson streets and the variable 30 km/h on the inner ring road (Pitt and Ferguson St).





- 59. For PN Intermediate School, I support the permanent 30km/h limits on South, Linton (Ferguson to College) and Chaytor but I request these also be extended to Linton (College to Park) and Batt streets. I also request that the 30km/h variable limit on College St be extended to Fitzherbert Ave to tie in with the extension of the College St School 30km/h VSL that I proposed in para 20 above, noting that a large number of PNINS students ride or walk along College St from the east side of the Fitzherbert-College intersection to the school.
- 60. For the Rangitikei/Featherston School Cluster, I support the proposal but request that the 30km/h variable limit along Featherston St be extended to Waldegrave St or Wood St and that permanent 30km/h limits be implemented on Waldegrave, Bourke, Campbell and Lombard streets to encompass more of the catchment area for Central Normal Primary School. Additionally, I request that Ngata and Carroll have permanent 30km/h limits implemented on them because of the number of Boys High students using them and also because of the presence of several early childhood education facilities, the retirement village and aged care facility and the hospital.
- 61. For the Roslyn School Cluster, I support the proposals but request that the 30km/h permanent limit on Shelley St be extended to Rata St and that a variable 30km/h be implemented on Rata and Keith as far as Haydon St on account of the number of trucks that use that route. Also, I request the permanent 30 on Vogel be extended as far as Rata St or Tweed St to avoid multiple changes of limit. I also request that the 30km/h variable speed limit along Featherston be extended westward to Ruahine St and eastward to Tweed St to encompass more of the catchment area.
- 62. For the Takaro Schools Cluster, I support the proposal but I request that the 30 km/h variable limit along Pioneer Highway be extended as far as Cardiff St to include the point near Mariner Reserve at which many Monrad Intermediate students cross Pioneer Highway. I commend the variable limit extending through the intersection of Pioneer Highway and Botanical Rd and I request that the same approach should be taken at other major intersections like Fitzherbert -Te Awe Awe, Fitzherbert Park, Fitzherbert College, College Victoria, College- Albert, and Ruahine Featherston.
- 63. For Te Kura Kaupapa Maori o Manawatu, I support the proposed permanent 30km/h speed limit area.
- 64. For Cornerstone Christian School, I support the proposed variable 30km/h zone but request that it be extended along Fernlea Ave to Schnell Dr to cover more of the immediate catchment area and to take account of the shops and park along Fernlea as these are both major traffic generators and frequented by pedestrians and children.

#### To the council

We fully support the lowering of speed limits around school zones and the surrounding streets as it is one of the factors which will reduce serious injuries and deaths within our community. We would like as much done as possible to support the Road to Zero aims.

We however do not support or understand the rationale, when lives are at risk, of just lowering the speed in major throughfares such as Featherston Street, College Street and Fitzherbert outside schools at peak times (drop off and pick ups) as in these streets and roads are high risk all the times. We would like all the Variable Speed Limit areas (VSL) to be changed to be permanently 30kmp/hour. As your own statistics show they are busy outside these times and crashes still occur. It make no sense to then increase the speed where there are busy streets/roads with not only schools and houses but businesses with different modes of transport crossing, changing direction, slowing down and stopping.

These streets/roads also have very little infrastructure for other modes of transport other than cars or to protect people especially variable users when they need to come onto the road such as when they need to cross at the moment. Reducing the speed would be one factor which would make it safer for people walking or cycling especially vulnerable users such as children, the elderly and people with disabilities.

By making these speed limits around school zones and the surrounding streets permanent would make it easier for people to remember the speed limit so stop confusion and help guide a culture away from a high speed mentality which risks people's lives. More importantly keeping it permanently the same speed it will be easier to change behaviour.

Making a safer environment would also encourage more people of all ages to walk or bike which would be another positive outcome from lowering the speed permanently. These would help families reduce their cost of living, reduce omissions and therefore help with climate change and improve the community's health outcomes.

With the upgrade of Featherston Street and safer infrastructure for pedestrians and people who bike the permanent speed limit of 30km/hr around high congestion areas such as schools and businesses and surrounding streets would align with the Road to Zero to make for safer communities and collectively encourage even more people to use active transport as a mode to travel around the city.

The resulting reduction in congestion from the road will aid the traffic and people who need to use motorised vehicle's such as ambulances, firefighters get where they need to go in easier and safer manner. This has to be beneficial to everyone.

Some people will argue that permanently lowering the speed will lead to decreased productivity due to lost time but past Waka Kotahi research data shows that this is not the case.

"We've identified the streets that are used by people getting to and from school, to work out where there should be slower speed limits." there is a problem here. Children are not biking to school because it is too dangerous. This is then being taken as evidence that there is no need for slower speed limits in some places, because not enough children are biking there. The whole approach is backwards. "Network consistency and drivability are also key considerations in the development of the school speed zones extents. For this interim plan, a 'less is more' approach has been taken for most schools" - so driving has been prioritised. If this is an interim plan, does that mean the zones will be extended until targets for biking to school are reached? In College St the VSL hardly extends 100m from the school gates, not many children live within that distance. In the past, most students walked or biked to school, and this is where we need to get back to. In Edmonton, Canada, in 2014 speeds were reduced from 50 to 30 around all schools 5 days a week from 8am to 4.30pm. This led to a halving of deaths and serious injuries. So I would expect our weaker proposal to be less effective than this. In 2018, the school zones were changed to 'playground zones', operating 7 days a week from 7.30am to

What periods of the day have been used to define the 'peak/weekday school hours'? We live adjacent to the Karaka St rear entrance to College Street School. In the mornings children start arriving from 8.00am, numbers slowly at first increasing in frequency to a peak closer to 8.45am. The Karaka Street school gate is locked from 9am to 2.45pm, access only through the College Street gate. In the afternoon Karaka Street is chaos for 30 minutes when the children leave. Nobody drives at 50km/hr, let alone 30km/hr, you would be lucky to do 10km/hr, as it can at times be close to gridlock. At 3.15pm the street is empty, no children, no parents, no cars. Outside the 1.5 combined hours morning and afternoon for children to arrive and leave, Karaka Street and surrounding streets, including Park Road, return to the normal quiet levels of activity. There are 8,760 hours in a calendar year. College Street school is open for 192 days in 2023 which meets the Ministry of Education requirements for a minimum 384 half days for primary and intermediate schools. 1.5 hours per day of high activity on 192 days equals 288 hours or 3.3% of the 8760 hours in a calendar year. Outside the hours of high activity all streets around College Street school are as likely as any street in Palmerston North City to be a location for a crash to occur. Blanket permanent 30km/hr for surrounding streets, remember that for 96.7% of the hours in a calendar year, 23.5 hours a day on a school day, 24 hours a day on weekends an school holidays, there will be no school related high act

I taught him how to navigate the cycle lane and lights on Botanical Road and sent him off. However by the end of Term 1 he'd had 3 or 4 near misses from vehicles straying into the cycle lane or failing to give way to him or there not being enough time to get into the correct position at the roundabout and Featherston lights. Assuming that it would only get worse in winter I put the bikes away and from then he walked or I drove him. I didn't let my younger boys cycle there at all. Do you have any other suggestions or comments to make?	My impression is that the PNCC is caught in, and participating with, a central government lie. The lie is "enshrined" in the PNCC statement "We're reducing speed limits on your street to keep schoolchildren safe". What are the real reasons for central government's demand for lower speed limits in cities, I wonder? (I leave that for you to find out.) The PNCC is proposing permanent speed limit changes that apply outside of the start and end of the school day! If the reason given – quoted above – were true, then most PNCC recommended changes would be VSL (variable speed limit) changes, that apply to the start and end of the school day and revert to the ordinary speed limit at other times. A variable speed limit can often be indicated by a static rather than an electronic sign. "A static sign contains all the information about the variable speed limit – what the speed limit changes to, and when."  Even so, the nearly halving of the current city 50 km/hr speed limit to 30 km/hr is ridiculous. For example, the current VSL electronically-displayed speed limit that I have observed near schools is 40 km/hr, not 30 km/hr. This is already frustrating for drivers but tolerable as the need-reason is obvious. At many locations, and many other times of the day, there are no people, nor moving cars, nor pet animals, in sight; so why require people to drive at 30 km/hr during those times? Drivers are already aware of the need to "drive to the conditions" which means voluntarily lowering speed when an obvious reason exists.  If the PNCC is forced to make speed limit changes due to central government policy then please use only VSL. This will save a huge amount of driver frustration and, I envisage, save a large amount of money for taxi users, and it will improve the "liveability" of the city as a whole. [I don't live in – I don't want to be confined in – just a small "neighbourhood" of the city!].

#### For the following reasons.

The Principles for Healthy Urban Development (Ministry of Health 2022) include four inter-related principles to consider in urban development processes to achieve pae ora (healthy futures) and achieve thriving outcomes for our communities. These principles are:

- healthy, safe and resilient communities
- wai ora healthy environments
- equity
- · mitigating and adapting to climate change

The Ministry of Health/National Public Health Service vision for healthy urban development is pae ora healthy futures for all. Pae ora is a holistic concept that includes three interconnected elements: mauri ora (healthy individuals), whānau ora (healthy families) and wai ora (healthy environments). These three elements are mutually reinforcing and strengthen improvements in health outcomes over time. We believe that this proposed interim plan change meets the principle of Wai Ora by creating safe zoning in relation to vehicle speed around their schools. This is particularly relevant in the clustering of schools and recreational activities in the Awapuni area.

#### Equity

Our urban environments influence how the socioeconomic determinants of health and wellbeing are distributed across population groups. Good urban development can promote equity and prevent inequity. As a result, environments do not disadvantage particular groups and so those groups do not in turn experience an unfair burden of the determinants that contribute to poor health.

Equity, as one of the principles of Te Tiriti o Waitangi, requires the Crown to commit to achieving equitable outcomes for Māori. To honour this commitment, the Crown must address and eliminate the inequities in the determinants of health and wellbeing for iwi, hapū, whānau and Māori communities.

In the New Zealand context, the population groups more likely to experience inequitable health outcomes include Māori, Pacific peoples, communities with lower socioeconomic status and marginalised groups. Other groups to experience inequities are people with disabilities and people across certain age groups, geographic locations, gender identities and sexual orientations (LGBTQIA+). Each of these groups contains people with their own unique circumstances and all of them can experience layers of disadvantage. For this reason, we need to use an intersectional lens when attempting to understand and promote health equity in the urban context.

We believe that this proposed interim plan change meets Te Whatu Ora's equity principles by providing improvements to the safety of all tamariki and their whānau, regardless of their race or chosen identity, and specifically supports those with disabilities.

#### Mitigating and adapting to climate change

Climate change is the biggest health threat facing humanity (WHO 2021b). It will affect the health, equity and livelihoods of our communities and change the environment we live in.

We believe that this proposed interim plan change meets Te Whatu Ora's climate change principle by making the areas around schools safer at drop off and pick up times. It is hoped that this reduces use of vehicles and encourages active transport for whanau such as walking and cycling.

Safer Schools Consultation Palmerston North City Council

As a resident of Sydney Street, I oppose the proposed implementation of speed restrictions on Vivian, Owen, Sydney, Regent and Grey Streets.

The current situation is a result of poor City planning. Rather than taking this reactive approach, please engage a traffic management and city planner with expertise in this area – one which can look at traffic flow (vehicular, pedestrian and active transport) as a whole, rather than trying to fit new requirements into a dated structure.

We in Sydney Street have been impacted already by the Council's decision to allow Horizons Regional Council to build a large complex in Victoria Avenue with insufficient off street parking for users of the building. Their vehicles are now parked in Grey, Sydney, Russell, Regent and Owen Streets, taking up all parks during the working week.

The Council are now planning intense housing around the area which will increaese the problem with more vehicles on the street.

With the current public transport system in Palmerston North, the lack of safe walkways within the City, and safe cycle ways, the Council is pushing people into vehicle use rather than out of them. We need a Council with a practical and clear vision of how to create a City which supports and fosters active ways of safely getting about, taking into account our weather.

Pedestrians share the use of these with users of mobility chairs, skateboards, and more recently, electric scooters (including discarded scooters). Cyclists too, use the footpaths albeit illegally. Despite the increased use of footpaths, they remain the same size and are not well maintained.

In many busy streets of the City, there is a lack of pedestrian crossings to safely cross the road. Pedestrians are now having to increasingly walk out amongst parked cars to cross the road – this is unsafe and not supportive of active, non motorized travel.

Traffic flow through the City gets clogged and instead of addressing this, the Council adds further developments without adequate consideration of the impact on supporting infrastructure. The establishment of the Horizons building is one example as noted above. The new walk/cycle bridge at the end of the Esplanade is a example of the Council's lack of planning foresight. Streets of the surrounding area are reduced to one lane, with cars parked on either side of a roadway which is very narrow. Reactive action has been taken with parking restrictions however this should not have been necessary. Rather, the City's planners should have allowed for this in their plans.

The City is granting developments at the edges of the City – both housing and industrial, yet where is the supporting infrastructure to enable people to get to and from and within the places safely without resorting to a vehicle? Instead, we are seeing increasing volumes of early morning traffic in Ruahine Street.

We have large trucks, milk tankers and stock trucks driving through the City – this is a sign that the traffic planning is a failure.

Investment in public transport appears to focused on large buses and upgraded bus shelters. We need a different approach. Perhaps smaller buses with the ability to go to more place aligned to business, school and family needs.

It is interesting that a walkway has been established for Whakaronga School. Why can't the same be done for City schools in other innovative ways as used overseas.

In respect of Carncot School, it has a bus service to get children to school safely. The bus stop for this is located in Owen Street. Why is further action required.

The City states it is committed to sustainability but decisions regarding development, roading, economic growth appear to be done in isolation. It is time for a grand vision to create a healthy, thriving city where people can work, live and play

I urge the City's planners and Councillors to think big and strategically. Please don't go adding more rules and regulations, more and more housing without first developing a City-wide plan. Stop tinkering around the edges and develop a transport plan which reflects our environment, our community and our economy.

#### Background

Thank you for the opportunity to provide feedback the Palmerston North Interim Speed Management Plan 2023. The Ministry of Education - Te Tāhuhu o te Mātauranga ('the Ministry') is the Government's lead advisor on the New Zealand education system, shaping the direction for education agencies and providers and contributing to the Government's goals for education. The Ministry assesses population changes, school roll fluctuations, and other trends and challenges impacting on education provision at all levels of the education network to identify changing needs within the network so the Ministry can respond effectively.

The Ministry has responsibility for all education property owned by the Crown. This involves managing the existing property portfolio, upgrading, and improving the portfolio, purchasing, and constructing new property to meet increased demand, identifying and disposing of surplus State school sector property, and managing teacher and caretaker housing. The Ministry is therefore a considerable stakeholder in terms of activities that may impact existing and future educational facilities and assets in Palmerston North.

#### Land Transport Rule: Setting of Speed Limit Rule 2022

As part of the nationwide programme under the government's "Road to Zero" National Road Safety Strategy, all councils must review their road speed limits. The aim of the review is to reduce the number of serious injuries and fatal crashes on New Zealand roads by setting safe and appropriate speed limits that better match the road environment. One of the key actions in the Road to Zero Strategy is to set safe speed limits around all schools by the end of 2027, with an interim target of 40% of schools by 30 June 2024.

As part of this strategy, Waka Kotahi New Zealand Transport Agency ('Waka Kotahi') released a new 'Setting of Speed Limit Rule 2022' ('the Rule'). The new Rule sets out new requirements and acceptable speed limits near schools, with the aim of making walking and cycling to and from schools much safer. The new Rule requires councils to set a 30km/h, either as a permanent or varied speed limit for Category 1 schools (which encompasses most schools in the district). The Rule also requires schools identified as Category 2 to have a maximum speed limit of 60km/h, either permanent or varied. Category 2 schools include rural schools where there is no, or limited numbers of associated pedestrian movements associated with the school in the road environment (including off-street pick-up and drop-off for all vehicles, including school buses).

#### The Ministry's feedback on the Palmerston North Interim Speed Management Plan 2023

Palmerston North City Council ('the Council') have proposed to reduce speeds around each of the schools within the main urban areas and villages within the Palmerston North District. The Council have released and

are seeking feedback on their Interim Speed Management Plan 2023 in response to the Rule and Road to Zero Strategy 2020-2023.

The Council have proposed speed reductions (either fixed or variable) for a total of 43 schools. The Ministry is strongly supportive of the proposed speed limit reductions around schools in the urban areas of Palmerston North and surrounding villages. The speed reductions proposed by the Council will provide greater safety for students during pick-up and drop-off times during school days as well as members of the public using school facilities outside of school hours.

The Ministry has consulted with the affected schools regarding the proposed changes. The Ministry has not received any specific feedback from the schools to date, but this will be forwarded to Council if/when received.

It is understood that the Council aims to collaborate with Waka Kotahi closely to ensure there is a uniform approach towards modifying speed limits for schools that have direct interfaces with the State Highway network. This consistency extends not only to the proposed speed limit changes but also their implementation measures and engineering interventions. However, the Council has indicated in their current proposal that they are yet to receive definitive information from Waka Kotahi regarding their plans, and hence, have had to rely on assumptions for now. Therefore, the Ministry requests to be updated and kept informed once definitive information from Waka Kotahi is obtained by the Council for their proposed works around schools with State Highway interfaces.
