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Students Against Cuts



Background

- Potentially the biggest cuts in history of the sector (Belgrave, 2016, p 246.)
 - Approx. 400-500 job cuts proposed at Massey.
 - Major programme cuts in College of Sciences, 60% proposed staff reduction (Goer, 2023.)
 - 31% proposed staff reduction in Humanities and Social Sciences (White, 2023). Paper and programme cuts to proceed in 2024.
 - Digital plus and low and no enrolments policies are designed to cut back on in-person teaching, meaning (further) diminished campus vibrancy, student choice and educational quality.
 - Fear of 'death spiral' scenario: reputational damage and loss of teaching provision leads to fewer domestic and international enrolments, leading to more cuts, resulting in further reputational damage, loss of teaching provision.
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How will this impact PN?

- Massey Manawātū campus has 5000 internal students, and most of Massey's 18000 distance students are taught from that campus (Massey University, 2022).
- Loss of millions of dollars of revenue as student and staff numbers reduce (education sector accounts for 8% of GDP in PN [pncc, 2020]).
- Diminished choice and in-person teaching will mean students will choose to study elsewhere, particularly in disciplines not suited to online or blended delivery.
- Loss of public good research provision.
- Intersecting and compounded impacts on PN businesses, community wellbeing and employment.

What we seek

- Pause cuts and return funding
 - Open the books; allow fair comment and alternatives
 - A full five-way discussion between MoE/TEC, management, community stakeholders, staff, and students
 - A better university: that serves the community; and is directed by the needs and aspirations of mana whenua, staff, students, and community

 - Support a Palmy 'Save Massey' Huivenue, networks, publicity
