Ora Konnect is an Alliance made up of Tangata Whenua Rangitaane o Manawatū, local NGO, Government and Māori organisations with a vested interest in supporting community and whanau aspirations in the 4412 (South Western Suburbs).

There are 18 partners who are part of the Ora Konnect Alliance that utilizes a Collect Impact framework and Whānau Ora Approach









4412 HAPORI

The 4412 postcode generally refers the western suburbs of Te Papaioea / Palmerston North City: Awapuni, Cloverlea, Highbury-Westbrook, Takaro. 28% (24,039 or 28%) of people living in Te Papioea live in the 4412. The average age of the 4412 population is 36 years, with half of the population aged 32 or under. Māori make up 23 % of the total population residing in the 4412 comparative to Maori across the City at 18%. Pasifika population rates are slightly higher in the 4412. Also Maori and Pasifika residing in the 4412 are more likely to experience higher levels of social deprivation that those living in other areas in the city.


Objective : The main goal is to make whanau homes safer and build a stronger sense of whanaungatanga within the community.

- Offered Land for Maara Kai projects



Central Districts Indian Association Inc

Our grandparents migrated over from India and Fiji in the first half of the 20th century for better opportunities and a better life for their children.

Now, our children are 4th generation and call themselves 'Kwis' but have not forgotten their Indian roots. Our organisation is highly active with our membership constantly growing.

Today the majority of our members are based in Palmy, as well as Feilding, Marton, Dannevirke, Woodville, and Whanganui.

Our Association has regular committee meetings (every two months) and regular newstetters are sent to our members, the major Indian Associations throughout New Zealand, politicians, the Palmerston North Câty Council, and even as far afield as India, Canada, UK Australia and Fiji, Informing them of CDIAs past, current and upcoming events.



Manawatū Telugu Association

We're from the South Indian states Andhra Pradesh and Telangana and we speak Telugu, which is one of the oldest languages in the world.

We're a group of 60-70 families in Palmy, with our people working as doctors at the hospital, professors and research scientists at Massey, and everywhere in between.

As a community, we love getting together, welcoming newcomers and celebrating our culture and food with the rest of Palmy.



Shree Dance Academy United by Dance Palmerston North

We are a multinational/multi ethnicity dance whānau where everyone feels safe and comes together to dance.

We learn and perform Indian dances and our members come from all over the globie – including India, Bangladesh, Fiji, Singapore, Nepal, the Maldives, South America, and of course New Zealand

Our group is open to all the communities tiving in Paimy. We love to integrate and help people to not only learn indian dance but also boost their confidence and interaction with other people.



Manawatū Hindu Society

We're the local Hindu community here in Manawatü who aim to serve the cultural, social, spiritual and religious needs of our people.

We have members from right across the world, especially from India, Pakistan, Bhutan, Bangladesh, Nepal and Sri Lanka.

In the future, we'd love to build a Hindu temple and community centre here in Palmy for everyone and to provide a fun learning environment for young people to embrace their religion and culture.



Manawatū Malaysian Society

We're made up of a rich mixture of cultures, including Malays, Chinese and Indians.

Our society was formed in 2009 to promote gettogethers and to provide a support base for Malaysian immigrants, students and visitors to the Maniwatu region. Earnity and family gatherings are so.

Family and family gatherings are so important to us, and some of the things we really miss about home is the warm weather and being able to find food at any time of the day (or night).



Satsang Ramayan Mandali

Most of our group come from Fiji. Indians were brought to Fiji in 1879 by the British to work on sugar cane fields and many ended up staying to make Fiji their home.

In the late 1980s there was a big coup which led to many Fiji-Indians fleeing to New Zealand, Australia, the US and Canada.

For those of us who made Paimy our home, we ve enjoyed celebrating our culture and traditions with the rest of the city. As part of celebrating festivals, we love welcoming visitors and feeding them delicious food, sweet and savoury snacks with tra.



New Zealand Bhutanese Omkar Trust

We are from the foothills of the Himalayas, Nepal, and we love organising activities for our community here in Palmy.

We have about 200 households or roughly 800 people in our group, and we're proud and pleased to be living here.

Bhutan is well known for holding some of the most vibrant and colourful festivals in the world. Their festivals are ancient expression of their culture. Their most famous being Paro and Thimphu Festivals.
