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

- Approximately 32 SVRs in Palmerston North City Council area and all are within 1 km of a school.
- Must be approved by MOH
- Can sell any flavour unless prohibited
- R18 under 18-year-olds cannot enter premises
- New regulations from September 2023 SVR's must be at least 300 metres from School or Marae.



General Vape Retailers (GVR)

Dairy, garage, supermarket, Bottle stores, \$2 shop. Can sell 3 flavours only, menthol, tobacco, mint. Some dairies have opened a Specialised Vape Retailer (SVR) also known as a 'store within a store'.



Submission to Community Committee Meeting of the Palmerston North City Council on 28 August 2024.

This submission is made with the support of the residents of 7(2)(a) Privacy

in opposition to the Council's proposal to install a public toilet at the end of Albert Street near the entrance to the river walkway. Each of the above properties 7(2)(a) Privacy outlook over the end of Albert Street so the new toilet block would be seen at varying degrees by each of the residents. The owners of 7(2)(a) Privacy also own the empty section at 7(2)(a) Privacy which, when built on will have the most direct line of sight to the new toilet block

The submitters have been in discussion with Mr. Hosking and other Council Officers over the past 12 months as the proposal to install the new toilet was being developed. We appreciate the decision by Mr. Hosking to pause the project to enable us to make this submission to the Committee.

We have obtained and read a copy of the Officers report to the Committee and will refer to it in some of our comments below.

Our concerns are outlined as follows. Expanded comment on each of our concerns will follow the summary.

- Problem definition i.e. is there really a demand for additional toilet in this area?
- The difficulty in meeting Council's own engineering standards
- Likelihood of increased antisocial behaviour
- Increases in probability of freedom campers

Problem Definition

The Officers report states that the problem or opportunity is to meet public demand for a public toilet at the end of Albert Street. Each of the options in the report discuss various locations at the end of Albert Street with cursory comment about the siting of a toilet in Waterloo Crescent not being justified. Importantly the do-nothing option does not seem to have been assesses.

There is no reference in the report to any Annual Plan submissions having requested another toilet in the area and nor does the report refer to any specific requests for a new toilet in the area from users. Justification for a new toilet seems to be based on a survey of the number of

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people accessing the walkway via Albert Street. The assumption seems to be that because the Albert Street entrance to the walkway is popular therefore a public toilet nearby is warranted.

A graphic is presented in section 2.6 of the Officers report that suggests that toilets should be spaced at around 1km apart. No rationale is presented for that spacing.

We have researched the internet and cannot find any standard regarding the recommended spacing of toilets on a public walkway. However, there is a New Zealand Cycle Guide that has been developed to assist in the design and layout of cycle pathways in New Zealand.

There is a section in that Guide discussing the desirability of having public toilets sporadically sited along off-road cycle ways. The table below has been extracted from that Guide. It sets out the recommended spacing of toilets based on the path difficulty.

Table 19: Toilet provision					
Grade	Distance between toilet facilities				
1-2	7.5 – 10 km				
3-6	15 – 20 km				

Due to its flat terrain in the vicinity of Albert Street the Manawatu River pathway would be considered equivalent to a Grade 1- 2 cycleway so the guidance suggests that public toilets be provided every 7.5km to 10km. At a reasonable cycling speed of say 15 kms/hour then adherence to the Guide would suggest public toilets being no more than 30 minutes cycle time apart. At an average walking speed of say 4kms/hour the Guidance material suggests that toilets based on 30 minutes walking time should be spaced at 2kms apart, and not 1 km as appears to have been arbitrarily adopted in the Officers report.

Along the 8km length of path between Maxwells Line and Riverside Drive there are already 5 existing toilets that are reasonably accessible to users. Those facilities are located at:

- Ruamahunga Cresecent
- Ayr Place
- Fitzherbert Avenue Bridge Esplanande
- He Ara Kotahi and
- Maxwells Line

The average spacing between the existing toilets along the pathway is 2kms which coincides with the recommended distance interpolated from the Cycle Guide. Another way of looking at it is that there is a toilet on average no more than 15 minutes (1km) walk in either direction from any point on the pathway. This indicates there is already adequate provision of toilets along the pathway.

We submit that given the apparent lack of any actual publicly expressed demand and that the spacing of existing toilets already meets the only reference guidance material that appears to be available, then there is no need for an additional toilet at or near the end of Albert Street so the "do nothing" option should be adopted. We do note that the Ayr Place toilets located in the Hokowhitu Scout Hall building are a little distance away from the main pathway so perhaps improved signage advising of the location of the toilets would benefit users.

Moreover, and for comparison purposes there are only two toilets on the 5.1km stretch of pathway between He Ara Kotahi and Linton – one located at the Dittmer Drive end and the other near the Urban Eels viewing area.

PNCC Engineering Standards

As shown in the graphic below there is an existing wastewater main (highlighted in light blue) that runs under Albert Street and is only about 30 m away from the site of the proposed public toilet block. It is assumed that wastewater pipes from toilet block will be connected into the existing 150 mm pipeline

The main pipeline was likely installed to service the former Higgins Contractors quarry that located in the vicinity. The quarry was closed approximately 25 years ago and the land was then subdivided into residential properties in Fairway Grove and Riverstone Grove. Wastewater from all the apartments along Fairway Grove discharge into a separate sewer line that runs under Fairway Grove and then joins the main system near the intersection of Albert Street and Riverstone Grove (the brown hatched line in the graphic above). Assuming the Council records are correct the section of sewer into which the wastewater from the proposed public toilets has not carried any flow since the quarry buildings were removed over 20 years ago as there are lo longer any connections to the pipeline. It is possible that the pipe has become blocked due to the ingress of gravel etc. during the period it has not been used.

There is only one toilet cubicle proposed in the new block which will generate a very small flow (perhaps only 1.5l/sec) a few times per day when the facility is used. Thus, the flow is far less than is necessary to achieve a daily self-cleaning velocity of 0.6-0.7m/second in the main sewer that is a requirement of the PNCC Engineering Standards. Consequently, the failure to meet Council's own standards means that intermittent use of the toilets, in the absence of any other flow, would inevitably lead to blockages and odours in the sewer, which will increase maintenance costs, create a public health nuisance, and an odour issue for residents nearby. It also potentially sets a dangerous precedent whereby Council will not meet its own standards should the toilets be constructed.

Thus, it seems unlikely that a resource consent for construction of the toilets could be granted unless some form of adequate mitigation of the effects of not meeting the self-cleaning velocity on a daily basis, could be developed.

Anti-Social Behaviour and Freedom Camping

As mentioned in the Officers report the end of Albert Street is a popular location for users to access the River pathway.

There is however increasing use of the private and poorly lit nature of the end of Albert Street by vehicles after hours. We submit that the problem will get worse as the existence of public toilets may attract other anti-social behaviour and freedom campers who will simply wait until the toilets are open each morning to perform ablutions etc.

There have already been instances whereby rubbish has been thrown over our fences from the Albert Street carpark. In one instance eggs were thrown at one of the apartments resulting in a difficult clean up.

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It is also unacceptable for residents to have to look out their window at a public toilet facility or to witness the increased anti-social behaviour that might occur in the area. Most other recently constructed toilets have been sites in an area where vehicle access can be made more difficult by use of a barrier that it lowered at a certain time – i.e. the He Ara Kotahi carpark. Our understanding is that a barrier cannot be placed across Albert Street as it is a legal public road.

Use of Ratepayers Funds

The submitters acknowledge that decisions about Council funding are rightly made at a political level, but ratepayers should have a say in how best funds should be spent. We also note the recent concern expressed by the Prime Minister about the extent of Council spending and whether funds are being directed appropriately to basic ratepayer needs such as infrastructure.

We, as residents in Fairway Grove have witnessed the construction of a new seating area at the end of Albert Street which took well over a year to construct at a cost rumoured to be more than \$1m. It has been completed for over 6 months now and we personally have only seen one person use the rest area. This type of expenditure may be what the PM was referring to.

Indeed, PNCC is facing a huge potential liability for the cost of a new wastewater treatment and disposal facility and should be doing everything it can to save money to pay for that scheme.

Summary

Given that there does not appear to be any real demand for a new toilet and the pathway is already well provisioned with public toilets we submit that there is no real benefit in spending the funds on an additional toilet. In any event the toilets as proposed would not meet Council's own Engineering Standards and thus would be unlikely to be granted resource consent. Moreover, the difficulty in preventing access to the toilets will, in our view, attract anti-social behaviour and freedom camping – all of which will reduce our quality of life in our homes.








02 MEDIA SUB-KOMITI





PNYC SCHOLARSHIPS


